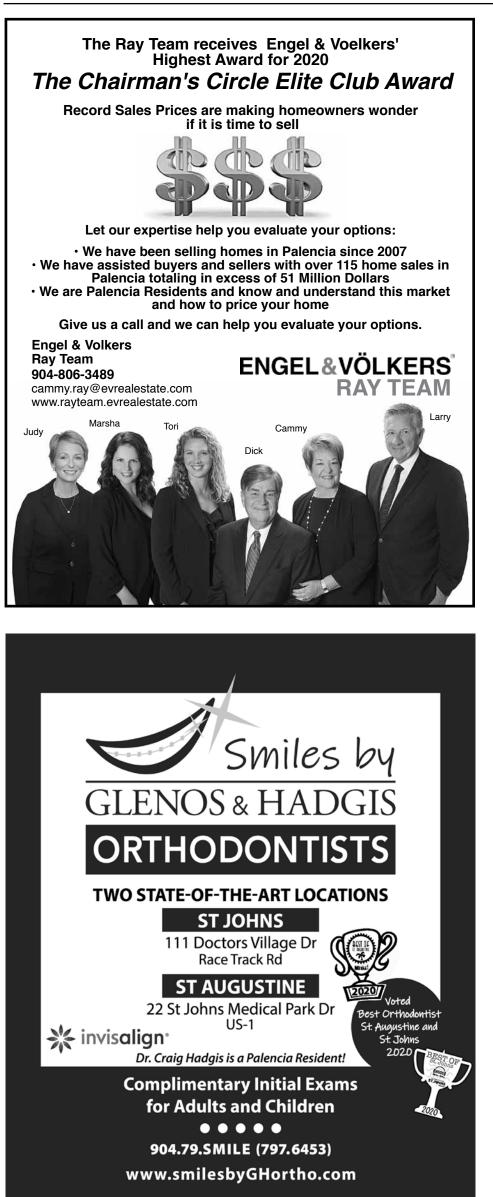

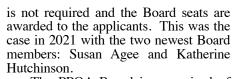

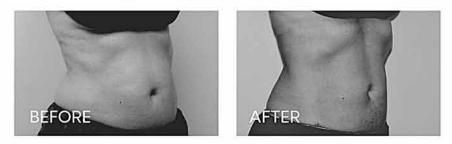




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### Palencia Resident Sydney Ott Recognized As An Athletic All American In Lacrosse

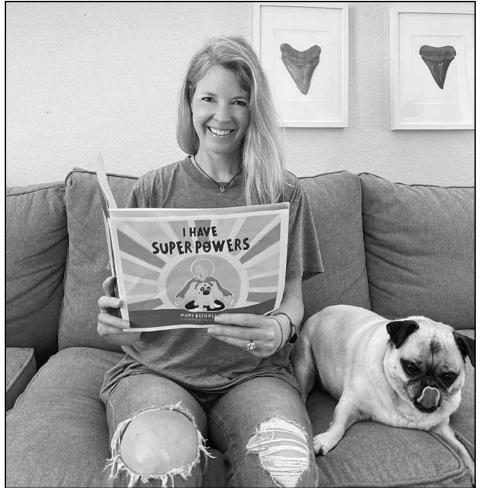

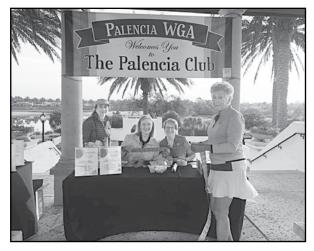

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Competing against the top 25 NJROTC drill teams across the country, Nease placed 3rd at the 2021 Navy National Academic, Athletic and Drill Championships on April 16.

The Navy Nationals comprise a series of nine events – five drill, three athletic and one academic – where the cumulative scores are added to determine the overall national champion. Nease represented NJROTC Area-12, which covers the 60 NJROTC programs across Northern Florida and the state of Georgia, having won the Area-12 Drill Championship last month in Lee County, GA.

Nease won 1st place in two events – the 16 x100 Relay and Unarmed Basic Drill. The team garnered six additional trophies, including 3rd place in Overall Athletics, Armed Basic Drill, Armed Exhibition Drill and Pushups. Two cadets earned individual medals for athletics – Emmelie Neff finished 4th in Situps with 320 and Amber Vidler finished 6th in Pushups with 86.

"These young men and women persevered since August practicing at 7:30 a.m.," said senior Naval Science Instructor Captain Scott LaRochelle. "Finishing third in the nation validated their commitment to excellence."

Nease has qualified and competed at the Navy Nationals every year since 2015 (last year's championships were canceled, but the team qualified), having never finished higher than 6th place. The top five schools are recognized with individual trophies. First Place finish during the Navy Nationals Academic, Athletic and Drill Championships. Palencia residents Peter Lemos and Jamila Rodriguez were members of the team. Water Problems? Ask Polly!

As things are going now it seems like the government controls more and more. My question is, I presently do not have a well. Do I need to worry that some day I will not be allowed to drill a well on the property that I own?

Who knows what kind of control the government is going to put on us next. As of now there are no laws by the Federal or State Government preventing us from drilling you a well. With that being said, there are local County and Deed restrictions in various areas that prevent you from using the water you sit on top of to water your lawn. In my opinion there will be a day when private well drilling will be heavily dictated by government due to water shortage, population growth, etc. I can't tell you to have your well drilled. All I can tell you is that water is essential to life. You make the call!

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### What Is Spanish Moss And Is It Good, Bad Or Indifferent?

Spanish moss is native to Florida and much of the Southeastern United States. It's scientific name or species is Tillandsia usneoides and is monocot like grass and is in the same family of plants as Bromeliads. The most well-known Bromeliad would probably be the Pineapple. Spanish moss is not a parasite as it does not steal food or water from the tree. Like many of the members of its plant family, it is an epiphyte. This just means it grows on another plant similar to many orchid species. It may also be surprising to learn that it is a flowering plant. Most people have likely never seen it bloom but some keen observers may have seen the plant's dried brown seed capsules. They are about an inch long and when they open, they release seeds that are attached to filamentous hairs. The hairs help to disperse the seeds to new locations with the help of the wind.

I have been told that the flowers have the smell of grape soda. I tend to believe this as I have smelled the flowers of other species of Tillandsia and they have a grape soda fragrance. If you are curious, I have the secret on how you can get a whiff of the flowers. If you place the plant into a plastic bag, this concentrates the ethaline gas that signals the plant to flower and it will also retain the smell of the flowers if the plant is already in full bloom. Just don't leave the bag in the heat or the sun as the bag will catch the condensation and the moisture will help the bag to quickly smell like mold, Yuck!

Well, down to the nitty gritty, Spanish moss is pretty much benign. It does add an insignificant amount of weight to branches. The weight of the well hydrated wood is the majority of a tree's weight. Please remember that correlation is not causation. Just because a dead moss laden branch is laying on the ground does not mean that the moss killed it. Most lower branch death is caused by the shade of the canopy above the lower branch. In effect, the tree killed a part of itself.

Spanish moss does add a little wind resistance by creating a larger sail than the canopy would natural have without it being there. You probably have also noticed as you clean up after a storm that Spanish moss is pretty easily dislodged in high winds and it falls onto lower **Continued On Page 17** 









Now that dormant season has come to an end, it is time to think about the University of Florida Department of Environmental Protection Best Management Practices (BMPs). If followed, they provide procedures for the healthiest lawn possible. More importantly, these principles help reduce nonpoint source pollution, which happens when misapplied fertilizer enters water bodies causing dangerous algae growth and contamination of our water supply. This is an ongoing issue in the state of Florida.

BMPs address every aspect of turfgrass maintenance, from fertilization, irrigation, and mowing to pest and weed control. While these practices might seem intuitive, they are not always followed and the result can be a less than vigorous lawn during the summer months. We still have home owners in Palencia who irrigate too frequently and mow turf too short (scalping), both of which leave St. Augustine grass vulnerable to pests and disease.

This article focuses specifically on simple themes and care required for the health of St. Augustine grass, specifically, Floratam, the cultivar that is most commonly used in Palencia. There is also information at the end on a wireless app to manage irrigation virtually.

#### Irrigation

More lawns are damaged by over-watering than by any other cultural practice. What over-watering does is hold grass roots in the top few inches of soil, resulting in a shorter root structure. This leaves grass very vulnerable to numerous issues like pests, fungus, and weeds. Healthy turf has deep roots which increases stress tolerance. To increase tolerance, follow these simple practices:

Water less frequently for longer periods of time. During active growth, lawns generally need watering no more than once or twice a week.

Water the proper amount. This means applying 1/2" to 3/4" of water during a single irrigation session, generally, 30 to 45 minutes.

Irrigate around sunrise. Irrigating in the early morning allows leaf blades to fully dry out during the day. Irrigating in the late afternoon or evening results in wet leaf blades at night, which increases turf susceptibility to disease, especially fungus.

**Note:** Don't be motivated to water more frequently if you have a well. In addition to the added turf stress, home wells are also subject to the same St. Johns County irrigation restrictions.

Mowing

**Height:** St. Augustine grass should be mowed at a height of 3.5 to 4 inches. This may seem too high, but this cultivar requires a longer leaf blade. Mowing too low, or scalping, a common practice, will stress turf, leaving it extremely vulnerable to disease, insect and weed invasion.

**Grass Clippings:** Leave grass clipping on the ground. They act as compost, returning valuable nutrients to the lawn and do not cause thatch.

### Warm Weather Turf Care

#### **Pest Control**

The major insect pest of St. Augustine grass is the southern chinch bug (Blissus insularis Barber), which can cause considerable damage if not treated immediately. Do a weekly inspection of your lawn and if you see areas that don't look green or healthy, address them right away. Chemical controls can be challenging, so best to employ professionals who are certified and have the knowledge to deal with each pest or fungus issue.

#### Fertilization

It's important to use fertilizer responsibly. When fertilizing near water, leave a 10 foot strip around the water as a buffer zone. This unfertilized strip will protect the water body from nutrient leaching or runoff. Thatch, as mentioned above, is a layer of dead turfgrass that develops between your lawn and the actual soil and caused by over-fertilizing and/or over-watering. It reduces air and water penetration and is an excellent habitat for pests and disease.

#### Weed Control

Proper fertilization, watering, mowing, and pest control will prevent weed infestation. Weeds don't create a void; they fill a void.

Irrigation System Wireless App: Most of us living in newer homes in Palencia live in "smart homes," with the exception of the contractor-grade irrigation systems. I have received numerous complaints from residents on this antiquated system. There is a wireless system available now designed to be used with homes that came with a Hunter PRO-C 400 system manufactured after March 2014. Information on this upgrade is available at Pro-HC Professional Grade Wi-Fi Irrigation Controller (hunterindustries. com). The app is free, but there is a cost for the control panel. I just purchased the upgrade and app which has a full array of options. It is easy to install and operates directly from cell phone, laptop or tablet. You remove the old panel and slip in the new one. It's a major improvement over the old manually-operated model and the rain sensor works!

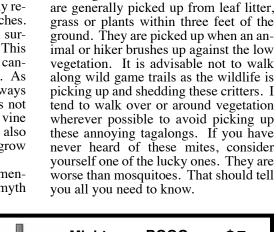

plants or the ground. The moss that remains on the tree becomes much more streamlined when it is blowing horizontally. The moss' structure does rigidly resist the wind like the tree's own branches.

The biggest negative that I can surmise is that it adds shade to the tree. This can help to prematurely cause inner canopy and lower crown branch death. As you may have noticed, the moss always hangs below the branches and does not cover over the upper foliage like a vine commonly does. The moss will also make it that much more difficult to grow grass under the tree.

I also thought it important to mention that it is an old wives' tale or myth





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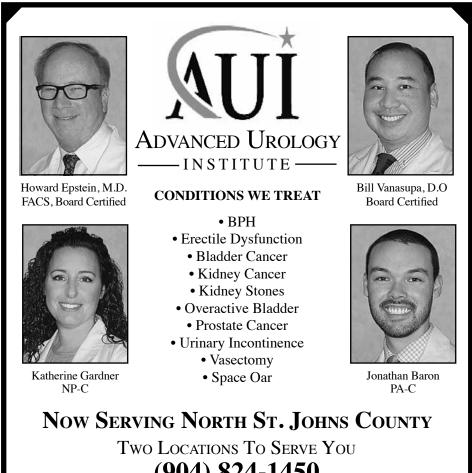
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Hello Fellow Golfers. Let's work on pitch shots!

These are the high soft vertical shots that will carry any trouble around the green, specifically bunkers and rough. A pitch shot lands soft and is very controllable. Most golfers will choose a wedge with 58 or  $60^{\circ}$  loft with minimal bounce. Whether it is a tight lie or a fluffy lie you want to make sure that the club face stays square or even slightly open through impact to achieve maximum height. One of the common faults to this shot is rolling your hands over and delofting the club, which in essence turns it into a pitching wedge or 9 iron which land hard and fast and releases. Keep the back of the left hand leading!

So let us talk about the steps we need to do to achieve a good pitch shot: 1. Survey your shot and decide on a

> spot where you would like the ball to land. 2. Set up with your stance open and the ball in the middle to slightly back of your stance.

> 3. Hands are a bit ahead and the club face is square or open, depending on how much height you need.

> 4. Take the club back in a smooth rhythm and continue through while not changing the angle of the club face and not looking up. One of the keys to hitting the ball in the air is not looking up and not trying to help the ball up, simply let the club do its job.

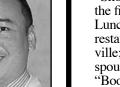

## Water Problems?

"Patience and kindness were always called for..." -Flannery O'Connor

In today's world, it often feels like patience and kindness are in short supply. Yet, in the small but populous country of Singapore, there is a National Kindness Movement which aims to encourage kindness and graciousness in Singa-

porean society. We desperately need more kindness and patience in our lives, our society and our relationships. The benefits of patience and kindness are tremendous: they are

good for the body, the mind and our relationships.

Living with patience and kindness helps us to live healthier and longer. Research shows that patience and kindness increase self-esteem, empathy, and compassion, and improve mood. They decrease blood pressure and cortisol, the stress hormone.

Physiologically, patience and kindness change your brain. Living with patience and kindness boosts your serotonin and dopamine (feel good neurotransmitters) and lights up the pleasure and reward centers in the brain. They also release endorphins, our body's natural pain killers.

Living with patience and kindness increases your connectivity with others and decreases the measure of loneliness that you feel. Patience and kindness can also be contagious: we can "catch them" from each other and they have a multiplying effect.

In our intimate relationships, patience and kindness can have powerful effects. Dr. John Gottman found that the Masters of Relationship-the couples who stay together and are relatively happy—have more positive to negative interactions and are far gentler and less negative even in the midst of conflict. When things are going well, the Masters of Relationship have ratios of positive

> to negative interactions as high as 20:1, and even in the midst of conflict they have ratios of 5:1, whereas the Disasters of Relationship—the couples that end up separated or divorced—have ratios of 0.8:1. Dr. Gottman also found that it is the "small things done often" (i.e. the daily acts of kindness and patience), not the grand gestures, that make the difference in relationships.

> There are at least seven benefits of living with kindness. One, it boosts your immune system. Two, it's good for your heart: oxytocin is released, which ex-

pands blood vessels, which reduces blood pressure. Three, kindness reduces anxiety. Four, kindness helps you in your relationships and your relational networks. Five, kind-

ness give you a sense of self-control. Six, kindness gives our brain a rest because we don't live in anxiety and stress. Seven, all humans need kindness.

Mayo Clinic has piloted a program of Loving-Kindness Meditation (LKM). What they found is that those who practiced LKM an hour a week felt more positive emotions while interacting with others. They also found that it reduces pain and tension from migraines and it reduces depression. One study found that a 10-minute session of LKM increased feelings of social connection and positive feelings towards others.

We can choose to be kinder to ourselves and others. We can extend ourselves grace and release negative self-talk. We can choose to act kindly daily and focus on being grateful. Remember, patience and kindness can be contagious, so let's start a pandemic of patience and kindness.

I recently read an article titled, The Forgotten Art of Squatting Is a Revelation for Bodies Ruined by Sitting. The article described squatting as more than the motion often used to sit down or bend at the hips. The author described the forgotten art of squatting as fully flexing the back, hips, knees, and ankles - bending all the way down to the ground while keeping both feet firmly planted. In much of the world this is a position used through life for daily cooking, work, sharing a meal, using the toilet, or even giving birth. Children are often seen making this motion when picking something up off the floor vs bending from the waist, which is seen later in life as a compensation. As long as they remain flexible, children will fully squat and return to standing with relative ease. It is not until years later, with loss of flexibility and balance where this motion, or 'art of squatting' fades. It is a simple



movement but can indeed be lost when not utilized regularity. Joints get stiff. Muscles and soft tissue lose flexibility. And power wanes, making it difficult to control a full squat. This may not seem like a big deal since we have modified our life requirements (raising our front-loading washers/dryers) making it rarely necessary but, there seems to be carry over into other activities, functionality and interestingly enough - health.

I was surprised to find in 2014, the European Journal of Preventative Cardiology showed those who had difficulty getting off the floor without support of the hands, an elbow or leg resulted in a threeyear shorter life expectancy than subjects who got up with ease, which brings me to the purpose of this column.

Don't allow short term losses become long term. What have you lost during CO-VID?

It has been over a year since COVID caused many changes in our lives - some of which may never return to "normal." But as people begin to venture out and attempt to return to the life they once knew, care should be taken, especially when it comes to returning to physical activity. At First Coast Rehab, we've recently seen a number of people who attempted to jump back into their previous routines only to be met with discouragement. It's not unreasonable for them to think "I used to be able to do this" instead of making themselves

You should schedule your pets vaccines two to four weeks ahead of time to ensure that they are protected. Most kennels require Bordetella and influenza vaccine as well as any other routine vaccinations such as distemper and rabies.

If your pet has never been kenneled, it's a good idea to do a trial date to see how your pet does first. Sending along a belonging of theirs that they are familiar with may help to decrease anxiety. This may be a favorite toy or their dog bed.

There are lots of good choices for care of your pets while you are away for your trip if they are not able to come along with you. If you have any questions, contact your veterinarian who would be happy to help you sort through what may be the best option for your pet.

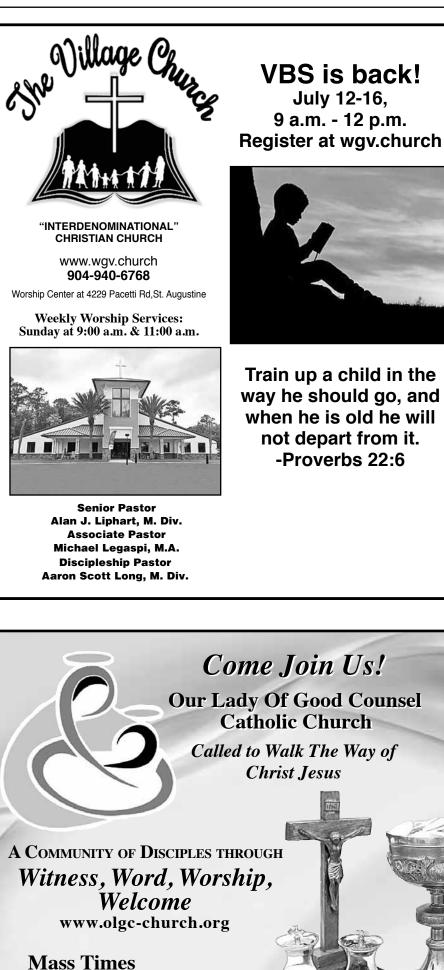

#### Must-dos to improve your hurricane preparedness

Hurricane season begins June 1. Here's what you need to know about hurricane safety preparations.

From federal agencies to local emergency response teams, lots of people work to improve hurricane safety response when a storm is possible. What can you do to prepare for hurricane safety well in advance? Make a hurricane evacuation plan, put together a hurricane evacuation kit and more.

How can I plan ahead?

When it comes to hurricanes, being prepared in advance can make your situation much better than trying to react in what can be a chaotic and stressful time. There are a number of ways you can prepare that can speed and better your response to a coming hurricane:

What should be in my hurricane evacuation kit?

Drinkable water – 1 gallon per person, per day,
Sealed, prepared meals – at least a 10-

day supply for each person, • First-aid kit,

• Prescription medications in sealed

• Waterproof, battery-powered or hand-

crank-powered flashlights and radios,Whistle or sound-signaling device,

• Multi-tool with a knife,

• Identification and medical records for each person,

• Waterproof bags or containers,

• Essentials for your pets:

• Water, food and medications - at least a 10-day supply, and veterinary records.

What if we get split up?

Decide in advance on two different meeting points in case your family or group gets split up. Your first meeting place may be rendered inaccessible by the storm, so it's important to have a backup location. **What else might I need?** Fuel and cash are important. If a storm

is predicted to head your way, keep your gas tank and your wallet full. If power goes out, gas pumps, ATMs and credit card machines won't work. Should we stop anywhere if we evac-

uate?

Once you're packed and on the road, do not stop unless traffic necessitates it. Stopping for food or drinks could significantly slow your evacuation.

Should we evacuate or stay?

Officials in your area or state may issue orders to evacuate or stay, depending on weather and traffic conditions.

**Evacuation orders:** There are two types of evacuation orders: voluntary and mandatory. Both employ an evacuation formula that helps officials determine what areas and populations should leave first. This is usually those most susceptible to flooding and severe damage.

Voluntary – Heed this type of evacuation order if you: Live in a flood-prone area, mobile home or structurally unstable building, and have any young children, elderly or special-needs members of your family.

Mandatory – If this type of evacuation order is issued, you must, by law, leave. Use only those roads identified as evacuation routes, even if they are heavily trafficked. Other routes may be closed.

Order to stay: It's possible officials may determine it's safer to remain in your home if leaving could lead to gridlock and danger.

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
