Director of Tennis Tom Salmon said this year's event begins at 4:30 p.m. on Friday, April 8th and ends on Sunday, April 10th after

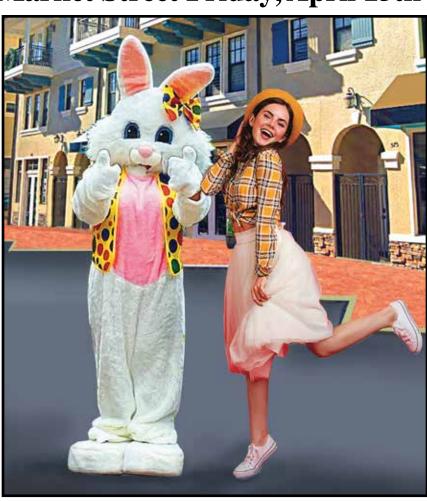

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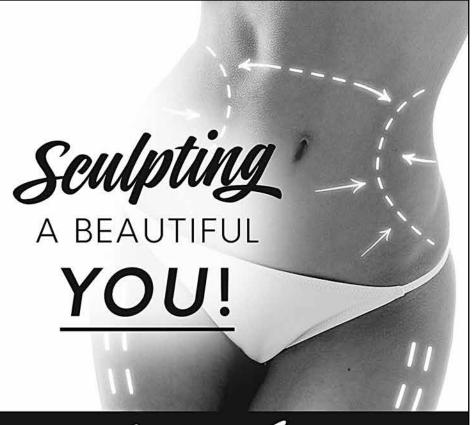
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Palencia's Architectural Review Boards

Palencia's Architectural Review Board was created in order to preserve the natural beauty of our community, to maintain a pleasant and desirable environment,

to establish and preserve a harmonious design and to protect and promote the value of property.

The originally developed section of Palencia (excludes Palencia North) has two (2) distinct Architectural Review Boards (ARB); one is strictly for the review of new home construction plans and the other reviews all improvement projects relating to all existing homes landscape or exterior facade.

- The new home construction ARB consists of a professional Architect, a professional Landscape Architect and includes a member of the POA Property Management team. This group meets twice per month to review new home plans submitted by home builders.
- The Improvement Project ARB consists of five (5) resident volunteers who review Palencia resident's ARB applications through an on-line system called "Smart Webs."
- Palencia North ARB has its own group of volunteer residents who handle all improvement project applications submitted by residents living in the Palencia North neighborhoods.

If you are considering making any exterior improvements to your home or landscape and are unsure if you need to obtain prior ARB approval, please contact the PPOA Property Management team. (see contact information in this article).

For the original section of Palencia, some projects that do not require ARB approval are:

- Re-painting your home/trim the same color as originally approved by the ARB.
- Re-roofing or replacing shingles that are the same color as originally ap-

proved by the ARB.

- Replacing dead/diseased landscape plants with similar plants as were originally approved by the ARB.
- Repairing or replacing damaged hardscape or equipment with similar material as was originally approved by the ARB.

Almost every other improvement project that you are considering for your home's exterior facade or landscape will require prior ARB approval before beginning the project. The Improvement Project ARB does not have actual meetings but instead is continuously reviewing applications as they are entered into the Smart Webs system.

How To Submit an ARB Applica-

Step 1: Go to Palenciapoa.com and click on Docs and Info, click Architectural Review, click ARB Application.

Step 2: Complete the application and submit to the PPOA Management team along with a check in the amount of \$25, the standard fee for all improvement project applications. A deposit fee is no longer required. It is advisable to include a copy of your lot survey with a sketch showing what changes you are planning to make.

Step 3: Wait for a response from the POA property Manager. There may be circumstances where the ARB will need additional information, which they will request from you or your contractor. Once the ARB makes their decision, you will receive notification in a timely manner. The average turnaround time from completed submission to final response was under five (5) days during the month of February

the month of February.

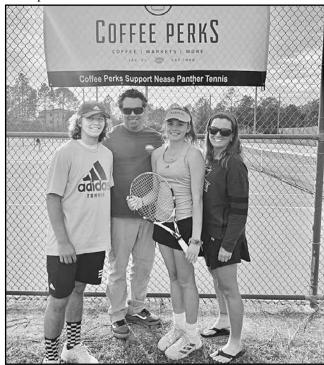
"When it started, I was on the board and had friends who had grandkids who attended Camp lies and children," she

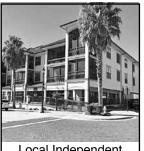

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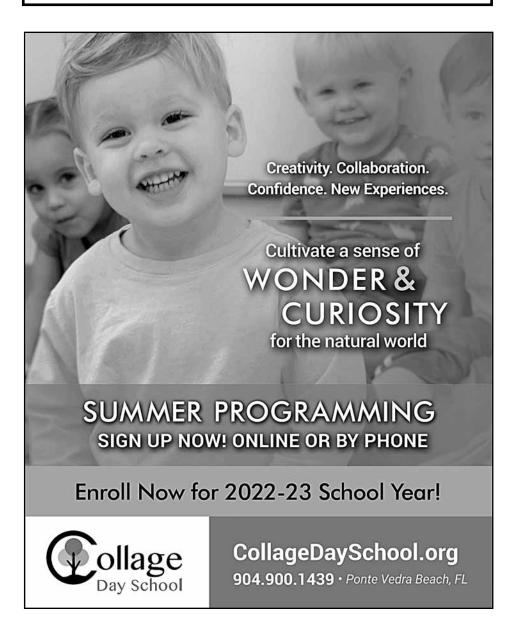
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Palencia Resident Performs In First Coast Opera At Romanza Festivale

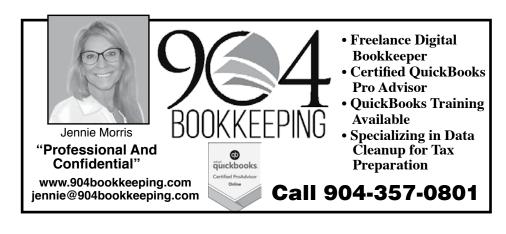

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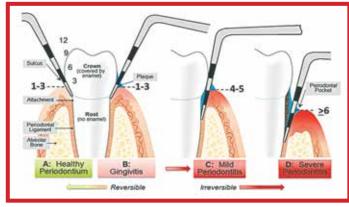
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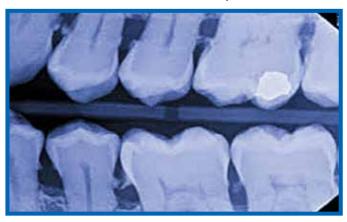

X-ray of bone loss and tartar/bacterial buildup

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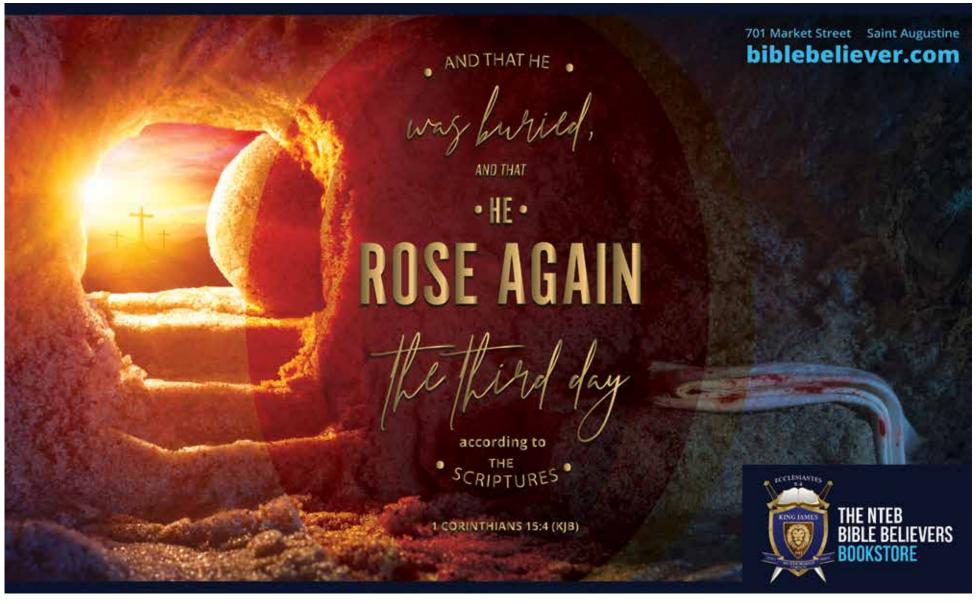

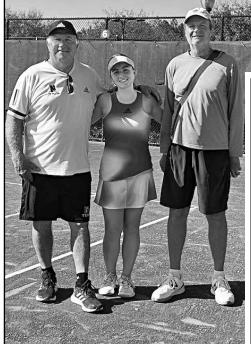
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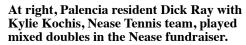

Palencia Club Hosts Nease Tennis Team Tournament

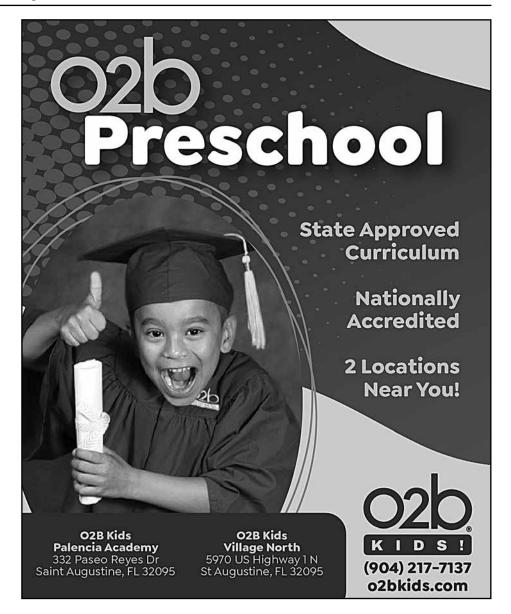

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Ask A Certified Master Gardener

Palm Trees For **North Florida**

Florida's climate is generally ideal for growing a variety of palms. Much of the state, as mentioned in my last article, is covered with sandy soils and beneath by limestone, both of which are beneficial to the growth of many types

In our area, the caveat for palm growing is that they must be able to withstand at least intermittent periods of below-freezing weather. Growers unfortunately provide conflicting reports of cold hardiness with the same species, which are a result not only of each type of cold spell, advective or radiational, but microclimate differences and just the palms themselves. Radiational freezes generally allow plants to better acclimate. Unfortunately, we have had at least one advective freeze this dormant season which is death to plants of all types.



Palms are not particularly highmaintenance, but, having said that, palm care is important during the growing season and prevention is always the key to plant health. Because our sandy soil does not retain nutrients well, potassium (K) and magnesium (Mg) are particularly important for good palm health and, in addition and secondarily, iron.

There are signs to look for to determine whether there is mineral deficiency in a palm. Symptoms of potassium deficiency, for example, typically begin with translucent yellow or orange "freckles" on the oldest leaves and they can then become necrotic.

If you notice the above issue, don't be tempted to prune the problem palm frond as this will worsen the issue by preventing the palm from translocating the remaining potassium to the plant's growing point. Instead, add a fertilizer specially formulated for palms with added potassium.

Magnesium (Mg) deficiency is common, especially on date palms (Phoenix species). Typical symptoms include a

broad band of chlorotic (yellow) tissue along the margin of the older leaves. The center of the leaf remains green. As with potassium deficiency, leaves exhibiting magnesium deficiency should not be removed until they are completely dead in order to allow the remaining magnesium to be moved to the newer leaves. Again, adding a fertilizer specifically for palms with added magnesium is the next step.

On the issue of pests and diseases, as a group, palms are fairly resistant but not entirely immune. Common pests include caterpillars, aphids, scales, and spider mites which can be well controlled by conventional means like horticultural oils or, if more serious, a bio-

The best approach when deciding to purchase any kind of palm is to look for the varieties that do well in our hardiness 9 zone. While not all may be locally available, here is a list of common name options to investigate:

- Everglades
- Talipot
- Dwarf sugar • Blue hesper
- Sugar cane • Manambe

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The Proper Golf Grip

Hello Fellow Golfers,

This is your only connection to the club. So important! So, let's get started and let's try to keep it simple.

1. Set the club down with your left hand only, placing the club under the left heel pad and curling your fingers

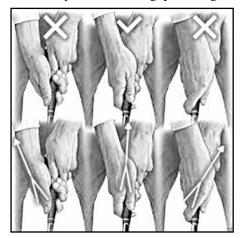


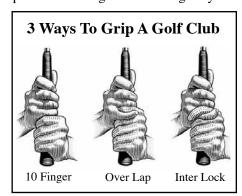
Image 1: Feel control of the club

around the grip, it should feel like it's in the fingers of your left hand especially the last three fingers. At this point the V formed thumb and first finger should point toward your right shoulder (if you are a right-handed golfer).

2. Then very naturally place your right hand on the club also letting the V formed by first finger and thumb of your right-hand pointing towards your right shoulder. This is a very *neutral* grip.

The variations of the golf grip... For a right-handed golfer

The more the V is formed by the thumb and first finger of the left-hand points to the right the "stronger" your



left grip is and conversely the straighter the left thumb is on the club the "weaker" your left grip is. The weaker the lefthand grip is, the more it allows you to

The pressure of the grip is very important. It is important that you do not develop tension in your shoulders and arms. So, relax your shoulders and arms and feel control of the club with fingers of your left hand. (See image 1)

Next question is: How do you connect the two hands? Here are three options:

1. 10 fingers or baseball grip

2. Interlock grip

3. Overlapping grip

The interlocking grip or the overlapping are by far the best options! The 10 finger grip lacks unity and is not as consistent. (See image 2)

Your grip might be the important thing in your golf game. It gives you power and control.

What To Expect From Family Therapy

Perhaps you have been referred for family therapy. What can or should you expect? Perhaps you are going into it with fear and trepidation that the therapist is going to "nail" you as a bad parent or partner. Perhaps you are looking forward to family therapy and believe that the therapist is going to "fix" your child or your partner. Rest assured, if the therapist is doing their job properly, neither is the goal of family therapy. So, what can you expect?

First, expect (or look for) a therapist who has training and experience in family therapy. There are a lot of generalists out there who hang up a shingle and profess to treat everything and everybody

fect the lives of all the people who are significantly related to him or her.

2. That satisfactory relating for one person is inseparable from the responsible consideration of consequences for all of the people to whom he or she is in significant relationship. (Boszormenyi-Nagy & Krasner, 1986). Therefore, the family therapist should take into consideration the welfare of all those to whom the identified patient is in significant relationship, whether they are present in the therapy or not.

Third, expect the family therapist to avoid pathologizing and to focus more on the interactions of the family members than the "identified patient." Many

> times, when families come to family therapy, they identify one member as the problem or the patient and just want the therapist to "fix" the problem or the identified patient. That is not how it should work in family therapy. Expect the family therapist to look at the relationships, the interactions and the communication patterns between the members of the family and to intervene to improve them. The therapist may do so by engaging every

member of the family and their perceptions in the process.

Fourth, expect the family therapist to take a strengths-based approach. While you are probably coming to therapy because of what you perceive to be a problem, your family is more than the problem. Your family has strengths and inner resources that need to be brought into play, and your family therapist should help you discover them.

Fifth, expect the family therapist to elicit and pay attention to your emotions. An important principle of family therapy is what we call "state-dependent learning," the idea that people learn best about emotions when they are in emotional states. Emotions are important in relationships and, therefore, in family therapy, and they are not to be ignored or dismissed. Rather, they need to be brought out. Emotions are the privileged

but do not have specific training or experience in family therapy. You would not go to a general practice physician to treat cancer or diabetes. In the same way, you should not go to a generalist to treat your family. Family therapy is very different from individual therapy and requires specialized training and experience. Your family is precious: that is why it deserves an experienced, welltrained therapist who specializes in family therapy.

Second, expect your family therapist to have a systemic perspective: that is, to see and work with your family as a system, an inter-connected whole. Family therapy is about intervening effectively in relationships. It considers both individual and relational realities. The fundamental design for interventions in family therapy is based on two convictions:

1. That the consequences of one person's decisions and actions can af-

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place for affecting change in family re-

Sixth, expect the family therapist to pay close attention to the stories that you tell about yourselves and to look for unique outcomes. The stories that we tell about ourselves can be limiting or empowering. The family therapist will challenge those stories that are limiting and help to draw out those stories that are empowering.

Finally, expect the family therapist to align with your desire for improved family functioning. There is a concept in family therapy called homeostasis, the idea that family systems work (often against the therapy) to return to their preferred (disfunctional) reality or configuration. However, Dr. John Gottman has suggested that every family has

two homeostatic resting places: a disfunctional and a functional homeostatic point. The job of the family therapist is to align with and to assist you toward your desire for improved family func-

Don't Wait Until You're On Vacation To Relax

The bags are packed, ipod is charged, and plane ticket is easily accessible. You're all set for a vacation full of fun and relaxation but why is it that after you reach your destination, you're fatigued, muscles are sore, and more than likely, you need a day to recover from traveling?

The answer can be summed up in five words: "One size DOESN'T fit all." Do you ever wonder why the seats on airplanes have gradually become smaller over the years? Of course, one must consider the current obesity epidemic in America and acknowledge that there is some truth to the fact that we can't put all the blame on the decreasing size of the seats. As a society we are getting larger but that's a topic for another article. Unless you've purchased a first or business class ticket, you will be seated in tight quarters for the duration of your flight. Your coach class ticket not only reserves seat 143E for you, but you are now deemed a "personal space invader," seated next to, or worse yet, between TWO other personal space invaders. Who gets which armrest anyway?

The truth is traveling for an extended period of time via car, train, bus, or plane, places increased stress on the soft tissues in our bodies due to maintaining prolonged static postures. Muscle fatigue, decreased blood flow to soft tissues and abnormal stresses placed on the body produces physical discomfort. The following suggestions are useful in maximizing optimal comfort even in the smallest, most uncomfortable seats and can be applied to most modes of travel.

- Alter your position frequently when seated, walk around at rest/fuel stops, or if on an airplane, stroll along the aisle.
- If you are to select your seat, you are in luck! The exit row is the "first class" for the man with champagne taste on a beer budget. Of course, you must be willing to assist others in case of an emergency.
- Utilize a lumbar cushion to place in the small of your back while seated. If you don't have one a rolled towel, blanket or sweater will work just fine. Placing one behind your neck can help minimize neck pain too.
- Moving your foot up and down as if pressing on a gas peddle and off will help with circulation and minimize swelling due to changes in cabin pressure.
- Using hands free devices for cell phones will not only aid in preventing potential dangerous situations, but they will also eliminate stresses through the neck, shoulders and upper back.
- If you don't want to check your luggage due to increasing baggage fees, distribute the weight of carry-on luggage evenly between shoulders/arms. Use backpacks with padded, adjustable straps or rolling bags with telescopic handles. And, ladies AND gentlemen, if your bag is too heavy to place in the overhead compartment yourself, don't be afraid to ask for help from the friendly individuals who will be flying with you.

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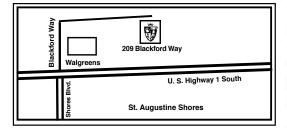
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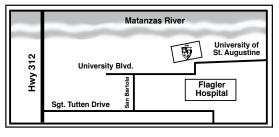
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Anxiety In Pets (Part 3)

Thank you for joining us for the last article in our series about anxiety in pets. So far we have covered the causes and prevention of anxiety and in this article we will talk about management of anxiety. Each pet is different and a customized treatment plan should be created with your veterinarian and/or trainer. The principles below constitute general advice and should not replace a consultation with a professional.

There are several training strategies that owners can use to treat anxiety. One method is called "counterconditioning". The purpose of counterconditioning is to change your pet's response to the stimuli responsible for anxiety, usually by replacing the anxious or aggressive behavior with a more desirable behavior, like sitting or focusing on the owner. Another common training strategy is "desensitization." The trainer slowly introduces the pet to the source of anxiety, preferably in small doses and at a decreased intensity. Repeated exposure and rewarding positive behavior can go a long way toward managing anxiety. This process is incremental and may be guided by a professional.

If basic behavioral modification tools do not result in the desired improvement, your dog may have a serious anxiety disorder. Some behavioral issues rise to a level which may dictate that your veterinarian recommends medications or natural therapies. SSRIs and antidepressants are occasionally prescribed for dogs with severe anxiety, including fluoxetine and clomipramine.

predictable anxiety-producing events like thunderstorms, fireworks, or car rides, your veterinarian might prescribe a short-acting medication to help your dog cope with the stress. Senior dogs with cognitive dysfunction syndrome may benefit from the drug selegiline, which can help reduce some of the symptoms of CDS.

There are also natural products that may improve your pets anxiety. Some products work best in conjunction with other medications, while others can be used alone, depending on your dog's

Natural products often use pheromones and aromatherapy to reduce anxiety. Talk to your veterinarian about the natural products best suited for your dog. Some dogs owners have reported success in using CBD oil to treat dog anxiety. Anecdotal reports from dog owners claim that CBD oil can be effective in treating dog anxiety. It's important to note, however, that although many humans use CBD oil for anxiety treatment purposes, there is currently little scientific data on how using CBD oil affects dogs. Additionally, CBD products are not yet regulated, which means that consistency and purity are not always validated.

Your veterinarian will help you come up with a treatment plan. Since excessive anxiety is often caused by a variety of factors, the best way to treat it is usually through a combination of training, preventive strategies, and in some cases, medications.

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Helping Neighbors: Signs They May Be In Need

Here are signs that your neighbor needs help and how to lend a hand.

Most of us have a neighbor of some sort or another. That person may live miles away or just across the hallway. But many people, particularly neighbors without family or friends nearby or senior neighbors, may be at greater risk of isolation and loneliness. These burdens can have a serious impact on well-being: Social isolation increases the risk of premature death from all causes, according to the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine.

No matter who you live next to, it pays to learn how to be a good neighbor and look out for one another. Here are signs that your neighbor needs help — and ways you can reach out.

Unopened mail and unclaimed packages

An overstuffed mailbox, newspapers that aren't promptly retrieved and packages that sit for days or more at a front door are all signs that a neighbor is either too ill or too overwhelmed to keep up with those daily tasks.

How you can help: Ideally, when you or the neighbors first move in, you would exchange information such as phone numbers and emails as well as emergency contact information. That way you have multiple ways of trying to reach them or a loved one in case of an emergency. If you don't have this information, simply check in and say "hello." Sometimes it seems like knocking on the door can be an imposition — but the simple act of seeing your neighbor, face-to-face, builds connections.

A change in your neighbor's routine Even if they live alone, many neighbors have well-established and visible routines. such as going for a walk at a certain time during the day. If that routine changes for more than a day or two, it may be cause for concern.

How you can help: First, take note of your neighbor's patterns — not to be nosy, but so you can notice if something is amiss and observe if your neighbor needs help. In that case, use your emergency contact information if you're unable to reach your neighbor in person.

Extremes in weather

Particularly for senior neighbors, rain, heat and cold can pose dangers if they try to leave their homes.

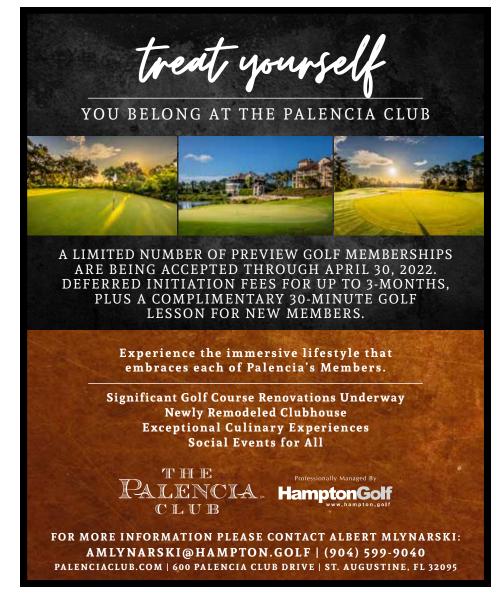
How you can help: Talk to your neighbors in need ahead of time and offer to retrieve groceries or run errands should conditions in your area worsen.

Yard upkeep or home-care issues

Take note of small changes in the outward appearance of their home or yard. For example, is the typically meticulously manicured lawn in disarray? Or, have you noticed damaged gutters, broken shutters or windows or other home-care issues? This may be a sign that your neighbor needs help.

How you can help: If you're comfortable, try to gently approach the issue with your neighbor and ask if they need assistance with tasks around the house outside. You may not be able to fix the gutters, but you may be able to help with other things, like mowing the lawn or putting out the trash bins. If you're not familiar or comfortable with your neighbors, consider contacting community resources who may be able to help.

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
