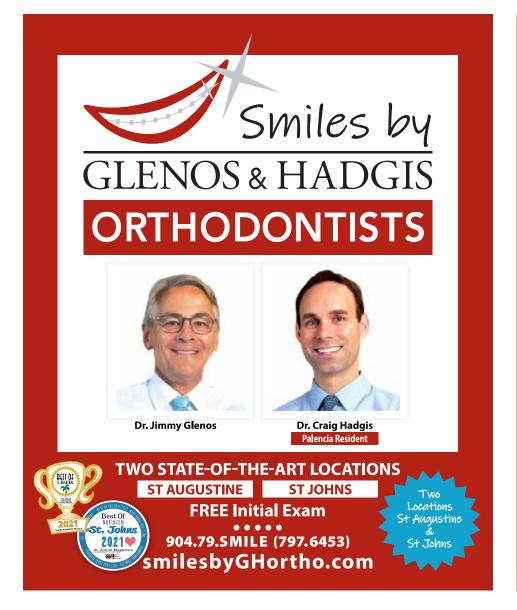

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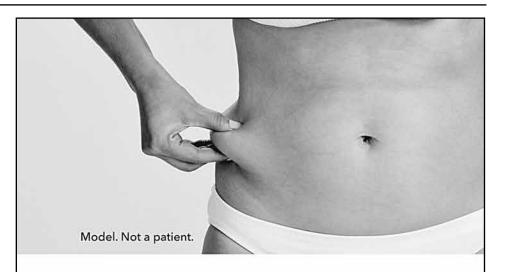
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Palencia Resident Honors Mom Who Survived WWII Nazi Slave Labor Camp

It appears the world has come full circle since World War II. Here we are again. Today, one need only turn to CNN or FOX to see courage in action. When we have had our fill, we change the channel or turn off the television and go about our day. However, do we really ponder the plight of mother and child in the scenes we have just witnessed-splitsecond decisions, foresight, timing, survival on sheer ingenuity, seeking elusive safety, desperate to protect those you hold so dear?

These are all too real memories for Palencia resident Cecylia Ziobro Thibault, an American Girl who survived the Nazi Slave Labor Camps of WWII. Her story was recaptured by CNN in the early 2000s, as her book, "Trapped in a Nightmare" was displayed in the Nazi Halagaget Museum in Wash-

in a Nightmare" was displayed in the National Holocaust Museum in Washington, DC. Today's news is a grim reminder of the atrocities she faced as a child. Yet, they are not visions she can 'turn off.'

The experiences that establish and grow the kind of pioneering, valiant spirit that drives a family to seek other shores remain in Cecylia. Her daughter, Palencia resident Elizabeth Beaton, describes her 87-year-old mother as resilient and adaptive, ingenious and inventive, fiercely loyal, and a true survivor. The same characteristics that led

John Leathers: Helping Those Who Could Not Speak For Themselves

In 1981 when Professor John Leathers was teaching law at the University of Kentucky in Lexington, 250 Haitian refugees from Miami were sent to the Lexington Federal Correctional Institution. They had entered the U.S. without legal documentation and were subject to exclusion hearings that might result in their return to Haiti.

There were no immigration-trained lawyers in Lexington at that time, nor were there non-government paid interpreters available. Professor Leathers was approached by management of the four largest law firms in Lexington. They asked for his help in representing the Haitian refugees, whom they felt were being treated unfairly due to lack of independent interpreters and immigration-skilled lawyers. Prison officials refused a request by Leathers and his French-speaking interpreter priest to meet with the incarcerated refugees.

Professor Leathers filed a federal class action lawsuit in an attempt to have the hearings delayed so that appropriate representation and interpretation could be provided the refugees in the exclusion hearings. U.S. District Court Judge Scott Reed induced Immigration & Naturalization to delay for training of local lawyers in immigration law and to secure independent interpreting services. Local pro bono lawyers began training in immigration law and exclusion hearings began to proceed.

Professor Leathers' immigration case finally ended for the 250 Haitian refugees when a U.S. District Judge in Miami ordered the original expulsion process be halted, the refugees to be freed and allowed to proceed with asylum requests.

As a lawyer, John Leathers and the Lexington legal establishment believed that in order for the U.S. legal system asylum process to work for any refugee, it had to work for every refugee, even those most shunned by society. Professor Leathers felt that if our Constitution did not protect the perceived "worst of it would not protect the best.

Professor John Leathers is our Palencia hero of the month.

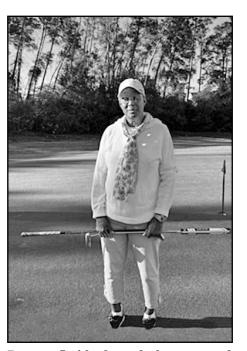

The Special Memorial tribute will start at 8:00-8:45 a.m. The golf scramble will start at 8:45 a.m. At the

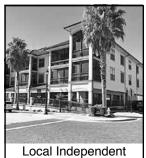

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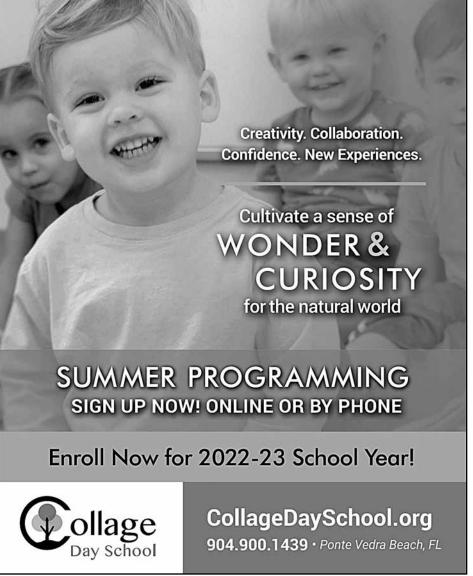
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Competitive Cheer And Dance At Nease High School

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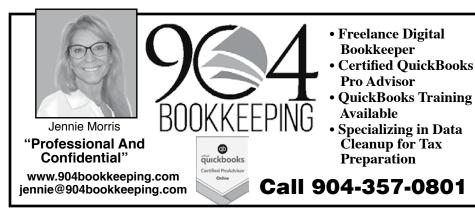

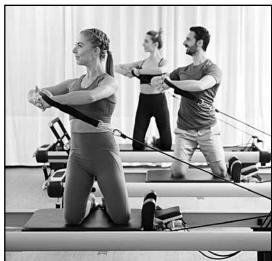

Kim is originally from Luxembourg and came to Saint Augustine in 2016 where she attended Flagler College on a scholarship and earned her degree in Sports Management.



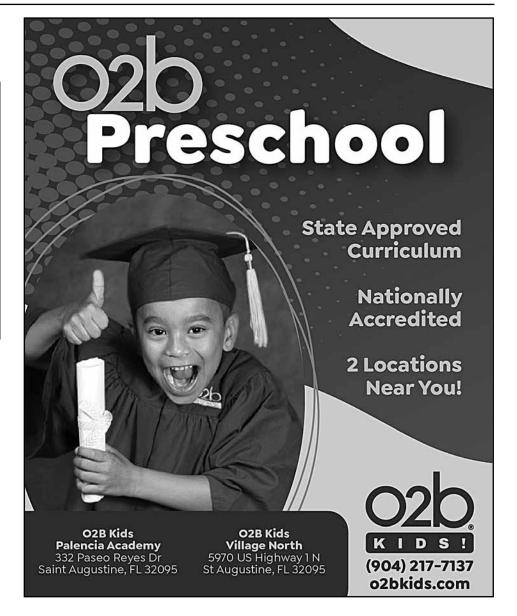

Tea – A Different Garden **Option**

Second only to water, tea is among the most widely consumed drinks on earth. It is valued as the centerpiece of ceremonies, a token of hospitality, a breakfast ritual and, of course, a good source of caffeine.

There are two main types of tea plants: China, and Assam. China teas are grown primarily in Asia; and Assam teas are grown in most other climate suitable regions of the world.

Tea is a camellia species (C. sinensis), and like many ornamental camellias, it grows well in sandy soils with high

yaupon tea give a caffeine boost, but this flavorful tea can also provide antioxidants. Researchers at UF focused on the Yaupon variety 'Nana' and found that the leaves had the same antioxidation potential as blueberries and as much caffeine as green tea.

In the noncaffeine category, Florida is home to a number of plants that are easy to grow and make excellent herbal

One of the most popular is Roselle (Hibiscus sabdariffa). Due to its recognizable scientific name, roselle is

> sometimes mistaken for ornamental hibiscus, and even marketed under that title. The flower calvxes have a tart, bright flavor that earned another name, "Florida cranberry." These can be used dried or fresh to give a "zing" to hot and cold teas. You can find roselle fresh at farmer's markets during the autumn

> Ginger (Zingiber officinale) is another common herbal tea ingredient that grows well in Florida. Paired with citrus, cinnamon, or honey, ginger "roots" make an excellent spicy drink. Harvest the rhizomes in the fall or once

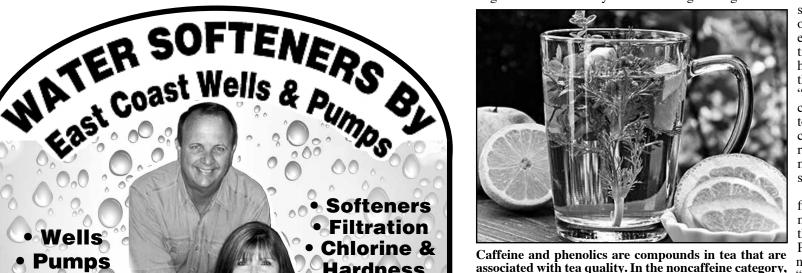
the tops have died back.

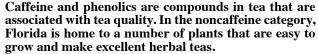
Mint (Mentha spp.) is probably the most well-known non-caffeine tea herb, and one of the easiest to grow. It attracts pollinators and does well in Florida's hot and humid weather. The peppermint and spearmint leaves provide the two most popular mint flavors, but apple mint, English mint, orange mint, and even chocolate mint are also available. Whatever the flavor, mint is a versatile herb and used fresh or dried makes a flavorful beverage.

One of the most ancient herbal tea flavors is Turmeric (Curcuma longa). It is touted for digestive and anti-inflammatory properties. Like ginger, turmeric, a perennial, is harvested in late fall or early winter when the plant goes dormant. The flowers are also tall and beautiful and a great addition to any landscape.

If you want to explore a new garden adventure, look for an Assam tea plant at your favorite nursery and try your hand at growing this great beverage!

organic matter and tolerates both humid summer heat and mild winter freezes. Researchers at the University of Florida (UF) are exploring the potential for tea production as a specialty crop. They are bringing together experts in horticulture, agronomy, soil science, breeding and plant pathology to develop suitable cultivars and growing recommendations for our region. The goal is to then identify those varieties and growing conditions that best maximize the compounds in tea leaves to produce high quality tea.

For just a little bit of science, caffeine and phenolics are compounds in tea that are associated with tea quality. The phenolic content in tea refers to the natural plant compounds which affect the flavor and mouthfeel of tea. These compounds in green tea are also excellent antioxidants and hence health promoting.

Tea is an evergreen, shrub, or small tree. The China type is dwarf, with small, dark green, narrow, serrated leaves. The Assam type, which is better suited to our area, is a larger plant, with green, less serrated leaves. Tea can be grown in full sun or light shade and in soil pH of slightly acid to neutral. Tea plants produce insect pollinated flowers, and cross pollination among two tea plants results in even more vigorous plants. A single bush can produce as much as a half a pound of tea.

In the caffeine tea category, another option in our area is the native Yaupon Holly (Ilex vomitoria). Not only can

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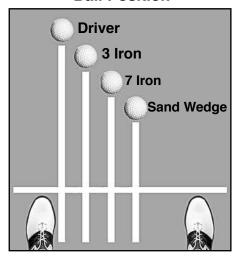
Ball Position And Alignment

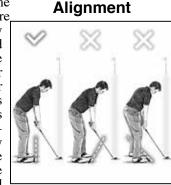
Your set up and pre-shot routine is pivotal in being repetitive and consistent, also in allowing the club to bottom out at the right moment. Start your pre-shot routine by getting a visualized line towards your target from behind the ball, then step up to the ball with your feet together, first step away with your left foot then step away with your right mak-

ing sure that your ball position is correct for the club you're using. Your wedges

and nine iron are normally played in the center of your stance as the clubs get longer, they move more forward



towards your lead foot ending with the driver played just off the inside of your left foot (if you are right-handed golfer).

Keep your pre-shot routine simple but do it every time so that you're in the same position to execute your shot.

So far as your alignment, if you lay down an alignment stick or a golf club along your feet, your feet should be aimed towards your target with a wedge. We like them slightly to the left to give your arms a little bit more room to move through the ball. With your driver, we normally like our feet aimed at our tar-

Turn Toward Each Other Instead Of Away

In marriage, we all make what we call "bids" for our partner's attention, affection, humor or support. They can be as minor as asking for a back rub or as significant as asking for support in carrying the burden when an aging parent is ill. When our partner makes a bid for our attention, affection, humor or support, we have a choice: we can either turn toward them or turn away. Turn-

ing towards is the foundation trust, emotional connection, passion and a satis-

fying sex life.
Dr. J John Gottman's research confirms the central role that bids play in a relationship. In a six-year followup of newlyweds, he found that couples who remained married had turned toward their partner's bids an average of 86 percent of the time in their Love Lab conversations, while those who ended up divorced had averaged only 33

percent. Furthermore, most of the arguments between couples in both groups were not about specific topics like money or sex, but resulted from failed bids for communication.

There is a reason that seemingly small interactions are fundamental to a relationship's future: each time couples turn toward each other, they are funding what we call their "emotional bank account." They are putting good will in their relationship and building up savings that can serve as a cushion when times get rough, when they're faced with a major life stress or conflict. Because they have stored up an abundance of goodwill, such couples are less likely to teeter over into distrust and chronic negativity during hard times.

The first step in turning toward each other more is simply to be aware of how crucial these micro-interactions are, not only to your marriage's trust level, but to its ongoing sense of romance. Remind yourself that being helpful to each other on a daily basis will do far more for the strength and passion of your marriage than a romantic dinner or a two-week Bahamas getaway. A romantic outing only turns up the heat if a couple has kept the pilot light burning by staying

in touch in the little ways. I am sure that it has never happened to you in your relationship, but you have probably seen other couples at a romantic dinner who are not talking or connecting with each other because thev don't know how to because they haven't been doing it in the little

One virtue of turning toward each other is that it is easy to accomplish. It only takes a small gesture to lead to another and then

another. "Turning toward" operates under a law of positive feedback: turning towards leads to more turning towards. Like a snowball rolling down a hill (obviously, not in Florida!), it can start small yet generate enormous results.

You don't have to turn toward your partner in a very dramatic way to see the benefit. Just get started and things will improve by themselves.

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Dry Needling Q&A

I have written on Dry Needling (DN) before but continue to receive questions regarding this intervention. The purpose of this column is to answer as many of those questions in the space allowed (500 words or less) but more info can be found on our website or can be answered with a phone call at 904-829-3411 by any of our DN clinicians (see ad).

Is DN new?

No, DN is not new. It has been growing in popularity since the 1960's when Janet Travell, MD coined the term Myofascial Pain Syndrome and used it to treat myofascial trigger points. It has been utilized for years by European physical therapists, which was my first exposure and was first approved in 1984 for use by US/Maryland physical therapists.

First Coast Rehabilitation (FCR) therapists have been teaching DN nationally and internationally since 2010, were approved in 2017 by the state PT Board to use in 2017, testified before the FL PT Board on behalf of all FL PT's, which was approved in 2020, and have since trained many others in St. Augustine, Florida and across the nation (see myopainseminars.com).

Why utilize DN?

The benefit of DN is multifactorial and rooted in pain science research. At its root, a trigger point, or hyper-irritable nodule within a taut band of muscle, develops when the muscle is overloaded. This can happen in several ways, but poor posture or unaccustomed activities are two primaries. When this happens, the basic contractile elements of the muscle lock up, causing compression of the vascularity, thereby depriving the tissues of oxygen, resulting in tissue damage and the release of noxious (pain stimulating) chemicals = pain.

When treating the trigger point with DN, a twitch response is elicited, which is protective response to the stimuli via a spinal reflex loop. The "twitch" is an indication the trigger point has been treated and the noxious stimuli have been flushed out. It may leave some muscle soreness but can result in an immediate analgesic effect, increase motion, strength and function. And because no medication is involved, there are not medicinal side-effects.

are not medicinal side-effects. What kind of problems can be treated with DN?

Almost anyone can benefit from DN. It can help with nearly all types of headaches, Ehlers-Danlos syndrome, shoulder, neck, back, hip, leg, foot and hand pain, where trigger points are involved. TMJ, jaw pain, and ringing of the ears caused by trigger points can also be treated. It can be used for orthopaedic and neurological problems where pain, muscle inhibition and loss of range of motion are a result of trigger points. It can also be used to treat scar tissue, pelvic pain and more.

Is it safe?

Yes. All needles are sterile. In a 2013 multi-site study in Ireland, which included 39 PT's in nearly 8,000 treatments, proved with proper training and practice,

DN is safe. (Therapists at FCR have been trained in the same techniques used in this study.) The major side effects were soreness, fatigue, an occasional bruising.

There are many more questions but limited space. What to do after treatment? How may sessions will it require? Once the trigger points are treated, are they gone forever?

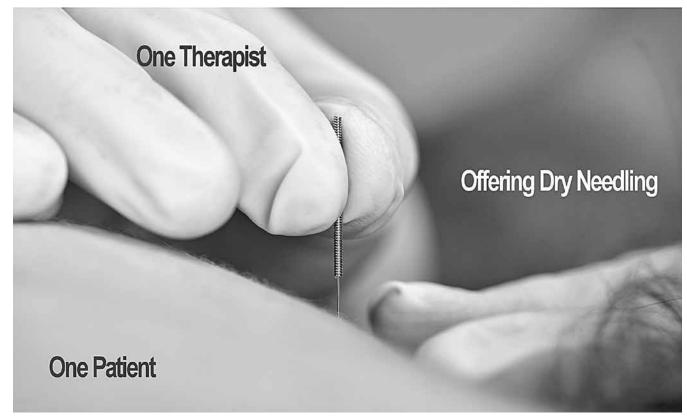

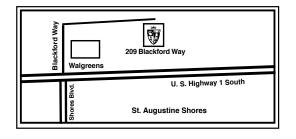

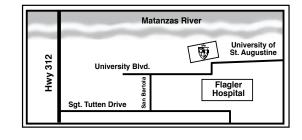
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Food Allergy In Dogs And Cats

For animals, itchy skin is often more than just a minor annoyance. Very quickly a mild itch can turn into areas of hair loss, rashes and skin infection. These are signs of a process known as dermatitis. Dermatitis can be caused by allergic (food or environmental), parasitic (fleas and mites), and traumatic

Food allergy is one of the most itchy conditions of cats and dogs. Within many foods are a variety of flavorings, colorings, and food proteins that are processed within the body. Often the proteins are combined into or changed into substances that are recognized by the immune system as a foreign invader, which the immune system then feels a duty to attack and removed from the system. The resulting inflammation that is caused by this attack may affect the gastrointestinal tract or other organ systems, but in dogs and cats most often it is the skin that suffers the most from this attack. Typically a cat will itch its face or neck with resulting hair loss and scabs. More common in dogs is foot chewing, itchy anal area and recurrent skin and ear infections.

Many pet owners make the false assumption that itching due to food allergy requires a recent change of the food. In actuality, the opposite is true. Food allergies require time to develop and most animals have been eating the offending food for several months or even years with no trouble prior to the onset of the

How do you know if your pet has a food allergy? Unfortunately there is no simple test for a food allergy and the appearance is difficult to distinguish from an airborne allergy, which is frequently found in the same patient. Some hints that a food allergy may be to blame are: nonseasonal itching, onset of itching before six months of age or after six years of age, lack of response to treatment for environmental allergies and parasites, concurrent gastrointestinal signs, recurrent ear infection and/or an itchy anal

What about the dietary allergy tests that you may have seen online and in dog magazines? The short answer is to not waste money on these tests. Blood tests for allergy can detect antibodies against certain food proteins, but this does not mean that the pet has an allergy. It may mean nothing more than that the pet has eaten that type of protein before. In addition, the pet's body alters food proteins during digestion and it may actually be the altered protein that generates the allergy. There is no predicting how protein can be altered, and therefore no test can be created for altered proteins. Many studies have shown that laboratory tests are simply not valid for determining if a pet has a food allergy. Note: laboratory tests HAVE been shown to be effective in determining environmental/ airborne allergies.

So what is the best way to confirm a pet has a food allergy? We perform what is called a "food trial." During this test, a hypoallergenic diet is fed for a defined period of time. If the pet recovers, the original diet is fed for up to two weeks to see if the itching returns. If we see recovery with the test diet, but the itch returns with the original diet, a food allergy is diagnosed. Then the pet is returned either to the test diet or another appropriate commercially available or home-cooked food perma-

If you notice any signs of dermatitis, speak with your veterinarian as soon as possible to ensure that your pet is properly diagnosed and is as comfortable as possible.

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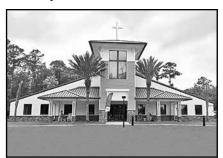

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Boost Your Home Pool Safety

Use these pool safety reminders, from guidelines for the height of a pool safety fence to pool safety equipment to keep on hand, to make sure your swimming pool is ready for the season.

Dreaming of a more leisurely, escapeworthy backyard? For many, that dream includes a swimming pool — either aboveground or in-ground — or a hot tub. Plenty of American homeowners already live that dream every day.

Swimming pools come with risks. Seventy-four percent of drowning deaths of children younger than 15 occur at a home, and it's estimated that a child dies every five days in a portable pool in the United States. That's why any pool — portable, above-ground, in-ground — should be installed and used in tandem with physical safety elements such as a pool safety fence and educational safety elements, including lessons for everyone and CPR training.

Teach children to swim

Certified swimming lessons help reduce childhood drowning incidents. It is recommended that children start swimming lessons by age four. Keep every child under adult supervision. Make sure adults have adult/pediatric CPR training.

Swimming pool safety Having a pool brings many responsibilities, such as making sure the proper regulations are met in your area, proper maintenance is performed and providing essential safety features.

Poolside safety essentials

Life-saving ring and Shepherd's hook, self-closing/latching gate (open outward, out of the reach of children), alarms on doors leading to the pool, and 60"-tall, four-sided fence/enclosure (one side should not be the house), and Pool-use alerts.

These tools may help you eliminate potential pool hazards:
A rigid pool cover (keep the control

out of kids' reach); a motion-sensor underwater alarm and rounded, crack-free drain covers (all screws installed).

Year-round pool safety reminders

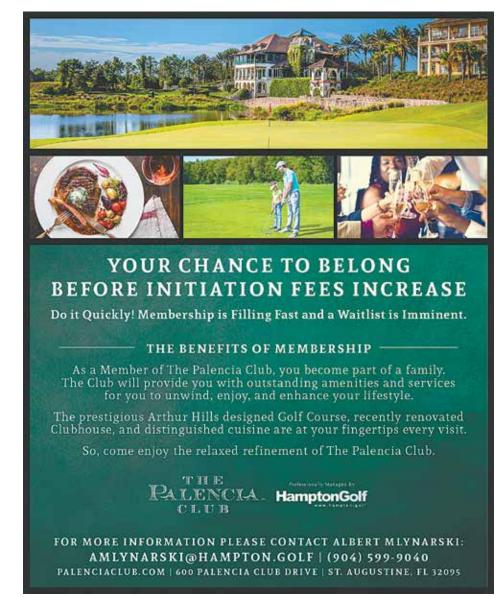
The importance of safety continues year round and even when your pool is not in service. Check that your pool meets city and state regulations and ensure no one can climb over, under or through the fence. Remove steps and ladders when not in use. Do not include diving boards and slides in your pool design. Lock pool chemicals in a well-ventilated cabinet. Never swim when lightning is nearby.

One step that you can take if you have a more permanent structure is to schedule annual maintenance on your swimming pool. Have a professional inspect the pool and drain covers. Then make sure family and friends that use the pool understand where the pool safety equipment is located and what safety requirements you have for swimming, such as providing adult supervision at all times for children. Many pool accidents occur when adults momentarily step away from the pool area leaving a child unattended.

Extra tips for your portable pool

Inflatable or soft-sided pools pose the same dangers as larger versions. Take extra care to help protect your family. Empty after every use and store out of reach or in a locked, secure cabinet. Supervise use at

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
