
Charity Tennis Tournament Nov. 5th-6th At Palencia





Changing Plans During Annual Enrollment

I'm considering changing plans during Annual Enrollment. What do I need to keep in mind?

You have the option each year to keep your current plan, choose a different plan, or switch to Original Medicare.

Rules for a Medicare Advantage Plan with and without drug coverage (Med Adv) and a stand-alone Prescription Drug Plan (PDP):

You can stay, join, switch, or drop a Med Adv or PDP during the Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) October 15 to December 7 each year.

If you have a Med Adv or PDP Plan and you don't join another plan by Dec. 7, you will be automatically re-enrolled in that same plan.

You can join a Med Adv plan even if you have pre-existing conditions. There's no underwriting with these plans. There are several enrollment periods where you can join a Med Adv or PDP plan for the first time. We will cover this in another article.

If you switch to a new PDP, or Med Adv plan with drug coverage (MAPD), your old PDP plan will end when your new PDP or MAPD coverage begins, which during AEP will start on January 1, 2023.

You can drop your Med Adv plan and return to Original Medicare (Part A and Part B). If you're returning to Original Medicare and joining a stand-alone PDP plan, you don't need to contact your Med Adv plan to disenroll. The disenrollment will happen automatically when you join the PDP plan. You can only do this once during this time.

Rules for a Medicare Supplement

Plan (Medigap):

If you have a Medigap policy, you have the option to stay, buy, switch, or drop that policy, but you will most likely be subject to underwriting and may not be able to get the same policy back. There are some exceptions listed below that I will cover in detail in another article

If you have a Medigap policy, your Medigap carrier can't drop you because the Medigap policy is a guaranteed renewable policy for as long as you pay your premiums.

If you want to buy a new policy, or switch Medigap policies during AEP, in most cases, you won't have a right under federal law to do so without underwriting, unless one of these applies:

• You're eligible under a specific circumstance or guaranteed issue rights;

• You're within your 6-month Medigap open enrollment period.

Once your application is accepted, your new coverage will start on January 1, 2023. It's important to note that you will need to contact your current Medigap policy carrier and ask for coverage to end.

It's important to review your Medicare coverage every year before the Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (AEP). A plan review doesn't cost anything! Consider it like your annual physical. Something else to "check-up" every year. Feel free to reach out to me if you have any questions.

Was The First Thanksgiving In St. Augustine?

In 1565, nearly 60 years before the Plymouth "Thanksgiving" feast, a Spanish fleet came ashore and planted a cross in the sandy beach to christen the new settlement of St. Augustine. To celebrate the arrival and give thanks for God's providence, the 800 Spanish settlers shared a festive meal with the native Timucuan people.

Don Pedro Menéndez de Avilés waded ashore on September 8, 1565. The Spanish admiral kissed a cross held aloft by the fleet's captain, Father Francisco Lopez, then claimed Florida for both his God and his country. As curious members of the indigenous Timucua tribe looked on, the 800 newly arrived colonists gathered around a makeshift altar as Father Lopez celebrated a Catholic mass of Thanksgiving for their safe arrival in the newly christened settlement of St. Augustine. At the invitation of Menéndez, the Timucuans then joined the newcomers in a communal meal.

Some Florida historians have argued that this feast—and not the one held 56 years later by the Pilgrims and Wampanoags in Plymouth, Massachusetts—was actually North America's first Thanksgiving.

Here's Your 'Recession Survival' Checklist

It's unfortunate, but recessions are a fairly normal part of the economic land-scape. When a recession occurs, how might you be affected? The answer depends on your individual situation, but regardless of your circumstances, you might want to consider the items in this recession survival checklist:

Assess your income stability. If your employment remains steady, you may not have to do anything different during a recession. But if you think your income could be threatened or disrupted, you might want to consider joining the "gig economy" or looking for free-lance or consulting opportunities.

Review your spending. Look for ways to trim your spending, such as canceling subscription services you don't use, eating out less often, and so on.

Pay down your debts. Try to reduce your debts, especially those with high interest rates.

Plan your emergency fund. If you haven't already built one, try to create an emergency fund containing three to six months' worth of living expenses, with the money kept in a liquid account.

Review your protection plan. If your health or life insurance is tied to your work, a change in your employment status could jeopardize this coverage. Review all your options for replacing these types of protection. Also, look for ways to lower premiums on home or auto insurance, without significantly sacrificing coverage, to free up money that could be used for health/life insurance.

Keep diversifying. Diversification is always important for investors — by having a mix of stocks, mutual funds and bonds, you can reduce the impact of market volatility on your portfolio. 


SIJ Dysfunction

"SI" or "SIJ" stands for the sacroiliac joint. The pelvis forms a stable ring using three bony structures, two side pieces call the ilium and a keystone in the middle, called the sacrum. The SIJ is where the sacrum and ilium come together on the right and left legs. This stable ring transmits forces from the ground, into the legs to the spine.

The SI joints are not supposed to move much. They should "wiggle", allowing for a little motion with walking, sitting, or standing. The SIJ moves quite a bit during childbirth to open the birth canal, which is why the SI joints are more mobile in women than men. But that said, excessive or imbalanced movement can be problematic and painful for women or men. Such imbalances can occur with asymmetrical movements, such as habitually crossing one leg over the other or sleeping on one side more than the other. Golfing can also create imbalance by producing a significant torque through the stance or lead leg. Motor vehicle accidents, falls, hard or miss-steps off curbs or in a hole can also jar the joint resulting in pain that may not be seen until weeks later.

A few weeks ago I encountered a woman with SI joint dysfunction and pain, which is the very reason for this month's topic. Unfortunately, she has been in pain for quite some time, but we are making progress. Because of her

SIJ imbalances, also referenced as pelvic obliquity, she has developed a difference in her leg-length, further creating changes in the lower extremity and low back musculature.

Treatment can be difficult but not impossible. If one SI joint moves to little (hypomobile) and the other too much (hypermobile), the body tries to provide ability to the hypermobile joint overusing muscles. This is difficult because there are few muscles that cross the SIJ. But through treatment of myofascial trigger points, restoring balance to the SIJ, and retraining using specific exercise, SIJ dysfunction can be overcome.

SI joint dysfunction is more common than people think, and often mis-

taken for a lower lumbar problem due to the pain manifesting in the lowest portion of the back/pelvis. It can also produce pain in the buttock region but rarely manifests down the leg. Pain is usually experienced more in sitting than standing. It can also be felt in the transition of sitstand. Although early intervention is best, chronic cases can be treated with success, as with my current female patient.

If you think you may have SI joint dysfunction, consult your MD or PT and become fully functional again.





More Fall Tree Pruning And A Great Project For The Kids!

My September article outlined basic information on tree pruning and this article focuses on more specific tree pruning for our Palencia trees to make them storm and disease resistant. Read on as well for a wonderful project for Palencia children.

The basic goal of tree pruning is to remove branches for clearance, reduce risk of breakage, or to reduce the size. Specifically, you want to: Keep it healthy by removing dead, diseased, or injured branches; Keep it strong by removing or reducing the length of stems or co-dominant stems that compete with the main leader; Keep it uniform by removing branches that cross or touch each other; and Keep it minor by tackling minor pruning and leaving major pruning to a certified arborist if your tree is taller than 15 feet.

Plants that produce flowers on current season growth such as abelia, crape myrtle, hibiscus and rose are usually pruned while dormant or just before the spring growth flush. Developing shoots can be pinched to encourage lateral branching which will enhance the flower display.

It is best to prune trees such as oaks, mahogany, olive, hickory, and other large shade trees either during the dormant season or just following a growth flush. They can be pruned at other times but try to avoid pruning when trees are just emerging from dormancy. Most evergreens such as Podocarpus, jasmines, holly, boxwood, ligustrum, juniper and wax myrtle can be pruned anytime. Terminal growth of pines can be controlled by removing one-half of the candle in the spring just prior to needle expansion. Pine candles are a distinctive bud that display as silvery white during the winter and look like their name implies - candles.

Fruit trees can be pruned during the dormant season to enhance structure or just after blooming to remove dead branches.

Here are a few more specific tips for three tree types in Palencia.

Crape myrtles:

- Rémové suckers (small sprouts that can develop along main stems or roots).
 Remove crossed, damaged, or dis-
- Remove crossed, damaged, or diseased branches. For crossed branches, remove the weaker of the two limbs that are crossing or rubbing.
- Practice tipping crape myrtles (not to be confused with topping) which involves pruning just the tips of the one-year old branches which are about the width of a pencil. This gives the tree a nice, neat rounded overall appearance.

rounded overall appearance.

Many homeowners and landscape professionals practice topping – commonly called "crape murder" which can be very damaging to the tree. This practice results in a "witch's broom" appearance - a tree that is no longer in proportion with numerous longer more unstable branches. Although topping may result in larger blooms, the flowers will also grow on thinner, weaker branches that will eventually droop, especially after rain, and are therefore at risk of breakage. Topping can also shorten the life of your tree as it is much more susceptible to disease.

Palm Trees:

• When it comes to pruning palm trees, less is usually better. Refrain from

pruning your palms by subjecting them to what is called "hurricane pruning" or "hurricane cutting," where all but a few fronds are cut off.

- Remove only the fronds that are completely brown and that hang below the 9 o'clock or 3 o'clock position. If you hire a professional, make your wishes clear to them and explain that you want your palms to have a rounded canopy, not a mohawk!
- The objective for palm health is only to remove the dead growth.

Oak Trees:

- For oak trees, you want to leave the lower branches. They serve as a structural reinforcement. This is particularly crucial during storm season.
- There is professional disagreement among arborists on whether to retain or remove Spanish moss, but it can be done to produce a cleaner looking tree.

Sycamore (Platanus occidentalis)
Wax myrtle (Morella cerifera)
Sweet gum (Liquidambar styraciflua)
Sugar berry (Celtis laevigata)
Willow (Salix caroliniana)
Mulberry (Morus alba)
River birch (Betula nigra)
Banana leaves (Musa acuminata)
Beauty berry (Callicarpa americana)
Bottlebrush (Melaleuca viminalis)
Elm (Ulmus alata, Ulmus americana,

& Ulmus parvifolia)
Grapevine (Vitis rotundifolia, Vitis vulpina, & Vitis cinerea var. floridana)

Hibiscus (Hibiscus rosa-sinensis) Hickory (Carya aquatica, Carya glabra, & Carya illinoinensis)

Why Are We So Divided By Moral And Political Issues?

Pro-choice or pro-life? Pro-gun control or pro-gun rights? LGBTQIA-affirming or denying? Pro-immigration or anti-immigration? Left or right? Liberal or Conservative? Democrat or Republican? Why are we so divided by moral and political issues? To understand why, we would need to start with an exploration of our common evolutionary heritage. Fortunately, John Haidt (along with countless anthropologists, historians, philosophers, and moral psychologists), has done the groundwork for us in his book The Righteous Mind: Why Good People are Divided by Politics and Religion (2012).

Haidt develops the analogy that the righteous mind is like a tongue with six taste receptors. According to Haidt, morality is like cuisine: it's a cultural construction, influenced by accidents of environment and history, but it's not so flexible that anything goes. Moral matrices vary, but they all must please righteous minds equipped with the same six social receptors. Haidt calls these receptors moral foundations. According to Haidt's Moral Foundations Theory, there are six psychological systems that compromise the universal foundations of the world's many moral matrices: Care/harm, Liberty/oppression, Fairness/cheating, Loyalty/betrayal, Authority/subversion, and Sanctity/degradation. Haidt's research has shown that liberals and conservatives tend to value and prioritize these moral matrices dif-

The Care/harm foundation has deep evolutionary roots in the adaptive challenge of protecting and caring for children. Today, it has expanded to many more classes of vulnerable populations. The moral matrix of liberals, in America and elsewhere, rests more heavily on the Care foundation than do the matrices of conservatives.

The original triggers of the Fairness/cheating foundations are acts of cooperation or selfishness that people show toward us. When people show signs that they can be trusted to reciprocate, we feel pleasure, liking, and friendship. When people try to cheat us or take advantage of us, we feel anger, contempt, and even disgust. On the left, the Fairness foundation is expressed in terms of concerns about equality and social

justice. On the right, the Fairness foundation is expressed in terms of proportionality—the idea that people should be rewarded in proportion to what they contribute, even if that guarantees unequal outcomes.

The Loyalty/betrayal foundation is part of our innate preparation for meeting the adaptive challenge of forming cohesive coalitions. The original trigger for the Loyalty foundation is anything that tells you who is a team player and who is a traitor. This foundation teaches us to love loyal teammates and to hate traitors. The left tends toward universalism and away from nationalism, so it often has trouble connecting to voters who rely on the Loyalty foundation.

The Liberty/oppression foundation evolved in response to the adaptive challenge of living in small groups with individuals who would, if given the chance, dominate, bully, and constrain others. The original triggers therefore include signs of attempted domination. The current triggers include almost anything that is perceived as imposing illegitimate restraints on one's liberty, including government (from the perspective of the American right). For liberals who are more universalistic and who rely more heavily upon the Care/harm found—the Liberty/oppression foundation is employed in the service of underdogs, victims, and powerless groups everywhere. For conservatives—who tend to be more parochial—the Liberty/ oppression foundation and the hatred of tyranny supports many of the tenets of economic conservativism: don't tread on me, don't tread on my business, and don't tread on my nation.

The Authority/subversion foundation is based on the evolutionary role of authority in creating moral order. The current triggers of the Authority/subversion foundation include anything that is construed as an act of obedience, disobedience, respect, disrespect, submission, or rebellion, regarding authorities perceived to be legitimate. Current triggers also include acts that are seen to subvert the traditions, institutions, or values that are perceived to provide stability. As with the Loyalty foundation, it is much easier for the political right to build on this foundation than it is on

Bunker Play - It Could Be Your Favorite Shot, No Really!


Hello Fellow Golfers,

Start with a pre-shot routine, picture in your mind the shot you'd like to hit. Have a slightly wider stance with your feet aimed to the left of your target (open) and your weight slightly forward inside your left foot.

Take a bit of sand and keep the club face open, just as you had the club face at address keep it that way though impact. As if you were serving pancakes, do not turn the spatula (club face) over, make sure you deliver the "pancakes to the plate."

Always commit and accelerate through the ball; if you don't the ball will stay in the bunker, so commit! You should take some sand... the more sand you take the more aggressive your swing needs to be.

Your expectation will change as you get better and better, maybe you first start out just wanting to get it out of the bunker and onto the green but then you will feel like you can get it up and down and then, pretty soon, you'll visualize yourself hitting it close to the hole or even in the hole.



Sequence — a word we hear a lot in golf these days. One of the most important moves in your golf swing is to completely load the right side before you transfer your power through to the left — that's your sequence.

the left, which often defines itself in part by its opposition to hierarchy, inequality, and power. However, in light of the January 6, 2021 insurrection at the U.S. Capitol, one would have to question the loyalty of far right groups to democracy and democratic institutions.

The Sanctity/degradation foundation evolved initially in response to the adaptive challenge of what Paul Rozin coined as the "omnivore's dilemma": omnivores must seek out and explore new potential foods while remaining wary of them until they are proven safe. Omnivores therefore go through life with two competing motives: neophilia (an attraction to new things) and neophobia (a fear of new things). People vary in terms of which motive is stronger. Liberals score higher on measures of neophilia (also known as "openness to experience"). Conservatives are higher on neophobia; they prefer to stick to what's tried and true, and they care a lot more about guarding borders, boundaries, and traditions.

The Sanctity/degradation foundation evolved from the omnivore's dilemma to the broader challenge of avoiding pathogens, parasites, and other threats that spread by physical touch or proximity (think about how this was activated during the COVID-19 pandemic). The original triggers include smells, sights, and other sensory patterns that predict the presence of dangerous pathogens in objects or people. The current triggers are extraordinarily variable and expandable across cultures and eras. A common and direct expansion is to outgroup members, particularly toward immigrants. Plagues, epidemics, and new diseases are often brought in by foreigners—as are many new ideas, goods, and technologies - so societies face an analogue of the omnivore's dilemma, balancing xenophobia and xenophilia.

The answer to the question of why we are divided by moral and political issues is not because some people are good and others are evil, but because we have taste receptors or multiple moral foundations and we tend to value and prioritize these foundations differently, as with taste. Therefore, to create greater civic dialogue, we need to expand our palate and consider the value of each of the foundations and interpretations.



Your Pet's Oral Health **Assessment And Treatment**

It's important to have your pet's teeth checked on a regular basis. As a matter of overall health, your dog or cat's mouth should receive a dental examination, cleaning and treatment on a yearly basis. And, pets with smaller mouths, such as pugs, chihuahuas and Siamese cats may need to be seen more often.

First Oral Assessment

When examining the mouth, your veterinarian will investigate your pet's teeth, gums and tongue, and inspect for any diseased or broken teeth that may need treatment.

One of the best ways to prevent dental disease in your pet is to brush his or her teeth on a daily basis, removing plaque and bacteria.

Most cats and dogs are uncomplaining animals. Buddy or Bella may have a painful fractured tooth and not show any signs until he or she starts dropping food. Other signs of tooth or gum disease may involve a change in appetite or extreme salivation.

When brushing your pet's teeth, use only toothpaste specifically designed for dogs and cats as human toothpaste can upset your pet's stomach.

Since some pets will not permit having a veterinarian examine their teeth, or if it is determined that dental work is required, your vet will choose the appropriate anesthetic for your pet.

Slowly introduce your pet to the process of tooth brushing. You do not want to make it a traumatic experience for your pet or it will only make it harder for both of you in the future.

While your pet is under anesthesia. the vet can more thoroughly inspect each tooth and provide appropriate treatment as well as scaling and polishing the teeth.

Start by massaging your pet's lips with your fingers in a circular motion once daily. When your pet is comfortable with this, start massaging the gums and teeth. Continue this process until your pet becomes secure with this rou-

Dental radiology is used to help the veterinarian visualize the roots of the teeth as well as bone disease below the gum line. Dental X-rays are the core diagnostic modality of veterinary dentistry. Dental radiographs assist in detecting hidden painful pathology, estimating the severity of dental conditions, assessing treatment options, providing intraoperative guidance, and also serve to monitor success of prior treatments.

When you are both comfortable, start brushing the teeth in small circular motions with the toothbrush or gauze but do not use toothpaste yet. You want to make sure to focus on the gum lines when you are brushing.

By the time your pet is a year old, you should schedule a thorough oral assessment with your vet. This is to treat any issues while preventing other problems from progressing.

Tips For Brushing Your Pet's Teeth

A special toothbrush specifically designed for dogs and cats can be obtained from your vet or try brushing by wrapping soft gauze around your finger.

The final step is brushing your pet's teeth with an approved dog or cat toothpaste. Keep cleaning sessions short and positive and both you and your pet should walk away smiling!





- Ask you to secure any required per**mits:** Most communities require the con-

 Not insured: Don't take promises of insurance compensation for any repairs.
