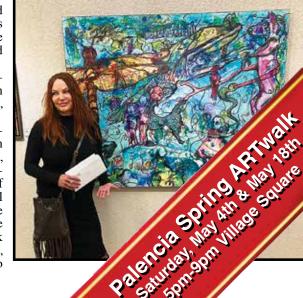

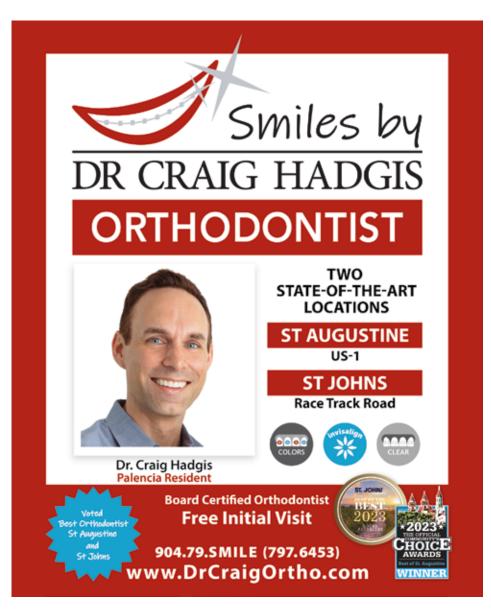

Now she understands why she was the girl who grew up in a pink house with a pink room and knitted a hot pink bedspread. Her "doodles" from Nicaragua are now being reproduced in her studio, embracing the color pink in combination with her family's heritage. 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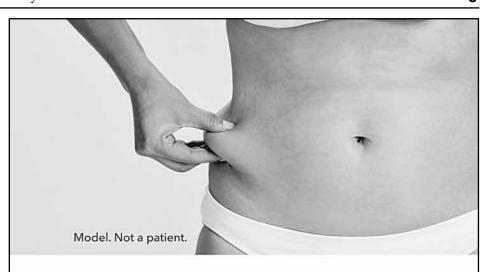
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Palencia Resident Dr. Craig Hadgis Acquires Orthodontic Practice

Is Your Estate Plan Up To Date?

Many individuals and businesses have paid less in taxes since the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (TCJA) was signed into law in December 2017. If you are not familiar with the TCJA, it doubled the federal estate, gift, and generation-skipping transfer tax exemptions. 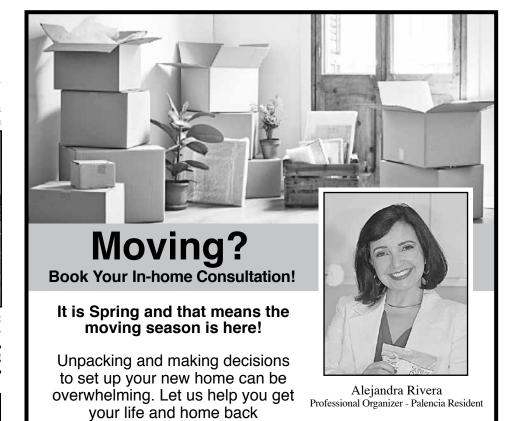

10 Medicare Mistakes And **How To Avoid Them - Part 3**

When you sign up for Medicare, you have to make several important decisions, and the rules and choices can be complicated. This is Part 3 and the conclusion of the article about the 10 common mistakes that prospective Medicare enrollees make, and steps you can take to avoid these problems from an AARP article.

7. Not Unerstanding Your Out-Of-**Pocket Costs**

Although Medicare pays the lion's share of the medical costs for its enrollees, prepare to pay some costs yourself. If you have original Medicare, you can get supplemental Medigap coverage and a separate Part D drug plan to help with many of these expenses. Here's a rundown:

Premium. Each part of Medicare may have its own monthly fee. Most people pay no premium for Part A, which covers hospital services. Whether you choose original Medicare or get a Medicare Advantage plan, you'll be responsible for the Part B premium, which is \$174.70 a month for most people in 2024. If you enroll in a Medicare Advantage plan or a Part D plan, you also may owe a monthly premium, depending on the plan you select.

Deductible. You may have to pay a set amount before Medicare starts paying for your care. The Part A deductible in 2024 is \$1,632 per benefit period — not annually and the Part B deductible is \$240 for the year. A benefit period for Part A begins the day you're admitted as an inpatient to a hospital or skilled nursing facility and extends until you haven't received inpatient care in either facility for 60 days. This means you can end up with multiple Part A benefit periods in a year, and each triggers another deductible. Many Part D plans also have deductibles.

Copayment. This is a fixed amount you must pay every time you receive a medical service. For example, if you have original Medicare without supplemental coverage, you may have to pay \$408 a day if you're in the hospital for 61 to 90 days during each benefit period in 2024. Part D plans have copays based on the type of drug you need.

Coinsurance. You may have to pay a percentage of the cost of a medical visit or service. If you have original Medicare, you generally have to pay 20 percent of the doctor and outpatient charges covered under Part B. Some of the most expensive drugs in Part D plans also may require you to pay a percentage of the cost.

8. Waiting Too Long To Buy Medigap

Coverage
A Medigap policy can pay some of the out-of-pocket costs that Medicare doesn't cover, such as your Part A hospital deductible and the 20 percent coinsurance in Part B. Private companies sell the policies, which are known by their letter, such as Plan G.

The federal government requires the benefits in each of the different types of Medigap plans to be the same, but premiums can vary.

If you buy a Medigap policy within six months of signing up for Part B when you're 65 or older, insurance companies can't deny you coverage or charge you more if you have health problems. But if you try to buy a plan outside of this window, companies in most states may refuse to sell you a policy or increase your premiums because of preexisting conditions.

Some states have their own rules governing Medigap policies, so if you didn't sign up during your enrollment period, check with your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) to ask about state specific Medigap rules

9. Not Checking The Prescription List In A Part D Policy

Whether you're planning to get your prescriptions through a stand-alone Part D plan or Medicare Advantage plan, take some time to learn about the rules, the drugs covered and your costs.

Make sure your plan covers your needed medicines. Each Part D plan has a list of covered drugs, called a formulary. If your drug is not on your plan's formulary, you may have to request an exception, pay for it yourself or file an appeal. And filling some prescriptions may require prior authorization from your insurer to be covered.

In addition to comparing premiums, find out how much you would pay for your prescriptions with each policy. Part D plans have several levels of cost sharing.

You may have a \$10 copay for some medications but a \$35 copay for others. Or you may have to pay 20 percent of the price of the medication. Make sure you know your plan's preferred pharmacies. This is where you can pay lower copayments.

Premiums and coverage can change from year to year. You can switch Part D plans during open enrollment each year, which runs from Oct. 15 to Dec. 7 for coverage starting Jan. 1.

10. Assuming You Can't Afford Medi-

Several programs can help people with limited resources pay their Medicare premiums and cost-sharing expenses.

Medicare savings programs help pay the monthly Part B premium and any Part A premium you might have. In some cases, the programs also can help cover the deductibles, coinsurance or copayments. Contact your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) to learn if you're eligible. These four Medicare savings programs aren't available in Puerto Rico or the U.S. Virgin Islands, but Medicaid, a joint federalstate or federal-territory program for people with low incomes, may be able to assist.

Extra Help is a federal program that helps pay for some or most of the costs of Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage. Visit the Social Security Administration's website, or call 800-772-1213 to learn if you're eligible for Extra Help and apply. Alternatively, visit Medicare's help with drug costs page for more information.

State pharmaceutical assistance programs are offered in some states to help eligible individuals pay for prescriptions. You can find them using Medicare's online tool or contact your State Health Insurance Assistance Program to learn whether your state has a program.

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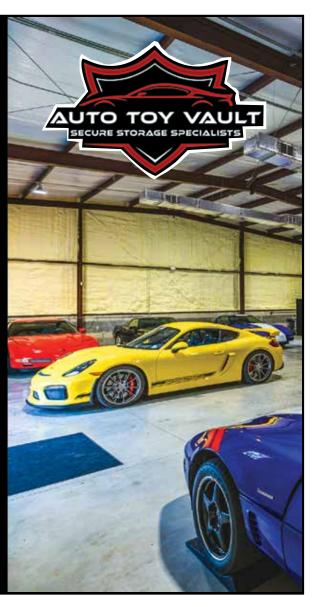
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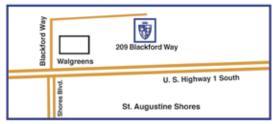


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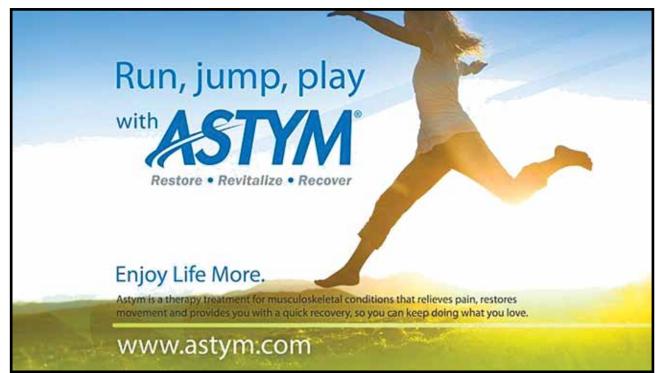
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Does Your Face Hurt?

Facial, jaw or neck pain is no laughing matter. Such pain can be debilitating and often is a result of a temporomandibular joint (TMJ) dysfunction or TMD. Some estimates suggest over 10 million Americans are affected by TMJ dysfunction. It tends to affect women more than men and although the cause is often unknown, it is considered a musculoskeletal disorder that responds to conservative treatments such as physical therapy.

The TMJ is a complex joint connecting the lower jaw (mandible) with the upper jaw (temporal bone). Two convex joint surfaces of the mandible, called condyles, rotate and slide in two concave surfaces within the temporal bone. The joints are filled with fluid and like many other joints, contain a fibrocartilage disc (like the meniscus of the knee). This helps fill the joint space and keeps the joint movement smooth

the joint movement smooth.

The TMJ is a very active joint considering it moves with each spoken word, each bite of food, every yawn, laugh, or clenching of the teeth, day, or night.

The joints are also very powerful with the "muscles of mastication", Masseter, Temporalis and Pterygoids producing up to 275 lbs, in some cases. With such forces, nightly teeth clenching, or "bruxism", is often a source of TMJ pain. Signs and symptoms can include radiating pain into the face, jaw or neck, jaw stiffness, limited jaw movement or opening, painful clicking, popping, or grating with jaw movements or locking of the jaw. Many times, these symptoms resolve on their own but if they become reoccurring or are constant, help may be needed.

Initial intervention can include the use of a stabilizing splint or bite guard but sometimes these become devices chewed through. More help may be necessary, particularly if TMJ pain is

coming from the muscles of mastication or something called an "internal derangement" develops. Internal derangement can be a displaced disc, dislocated disc, jaw injury or faulty mechanics within one or both joints. If this is the case, treatment to the joint can help restore proper joint motion, treatment to the muscles can reduce the pain and the forces produced from chewing, talking, or yawning can be distributed in a more

balanced manner.

Treatment of

Treatment of TMD usually includes soft tissues manipulation to help relieve muscle tension in the head, neck, and face. Dry needling may be used to eliminate painful trigger points, often followed by stretching and strengthening, which are helpful in restoring muscle balance. The treatment goal is to provide better control movement of the movement in the joints.

In some cases, although the pain may present in the jaw, the neck can be a contributing factor. And, in such cases, postural alignment is considered as well as muscle pain that may refer to the jaw and face.

If you are experiencing pain as described above, perhaps consider talking to your doctor or dentist about receiving physical therapy, or simply call and speak with your physical therapist for additional information.

Raised Beds: Options To Add **Beauty To Your Landscape**

The maintenance and care of our landscape turf is one of the most expensive and time consuming chores we are faced with, in addition to being a lot less satisfying than planting gardens. The cost is high to keep it all going whether vou are a DIY or employ a lawn care company.



This article will feature a number of options, more in photos, to inspire you to think about reducing the amount of turf, especially in your back landscapes, and creating both artistic and useful designs with raised bed gardening. Putting in raised beds not only provides a venue for beautiful plants but will break up your vast turf desert. They aren't just for vegetables!

Raised bed gardens can be constructed of any material - brick, stone, or wood, depending on your preference. They can be simple or complex, large, or small, any shape and depth. Local garden centers now sell all the components needed to create any size raised bed, with no work other than assembly.

One photo shows a spiral herb/flower garden. Spirals are not only attractive but create microclimates within the spiral. There is no set rule for either height or width, but a typical spiral is about 6 feet tall, making the tallest spiral in the middle and shorter toward the outer edges. As you build the spiral, add your



bagged soil to support the walls. Flowers can be grown in one round and herbs

Another option is cinder blocks, an inexpensive way to build a large, raised bed garden to grow any number of vegetables and flowers. You can grow marigolds, for example, in the holes in the

blocks to create a beautiful edge around the entire block bed to cover the blocks

An additional photo shows a backyard makeover that includes two beautiful, raised beds with a semi-circular rock wall behind it. This is again, simply an idea to spark your thinking about possibilities that use wood and stone to create a beautiful design, a venue for flowers, a focal point, and a nice gathering place.

As mentioned in all previous articles, don't be reluctant to try something new in your landscape. Designing an artistic landscape is like any craft project or hobby. And, when you look out your back win-

dows, you will be amazed and delighted with the outdoor painting you have cre-

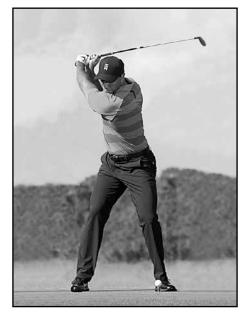
Quick Golf Tip: Turn Left Shoulder Over Right Leg

As golfers, we often look for a simple tip or motion that allows us to achieve a complex move. This is the case with the simple thought of turning your left shoulder fully to where the top of your backswing is parallel to your right leg; that is a full backswing. Can everyone get there? Probably not, but the goal is to slowly turn more with the help of your hips and weight transfer. This is a simple thought that allows you to build power.

Here are the steps:

- 1. Make sure that your alignment and ball position are correct, which will allow you to turn fully
- 2. Take a nice, slow, low backswing, allowing yourself to turn as much as you feel comfortable; feel the left shoulder over the right leg.
- 3. Once you have completed your backswing, you can now accelerate through the ball, building up that club head speed we all want. These are three simple thoughts for you to work on the range and little by little; you will build a more powerful backswing. Your backswing doesn't have to be long. You have to feel like that left shoulder, at the top, is as much over your right leg as you can



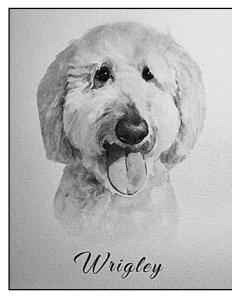
comfortably achieve.

Why Are We So Divided By **Moral And Political Issues?** Part 1

Pro-choice or pro-life? Pro-gun control or pro-gun rights? LGBTQIA-af-firming or denying? Pro-immigration or anti-immigration? Left or right? Liberal or Conservative? Democrat or Republican? Why are we so divided by moral and political issues? To understand why, we would need to start with an exploration of our common evolutionary heritage. Fortunately, John Haidt (along with countless anthropologists, historians, philosophers, and moral psychologists), has done the groundwork for us

in his book. Haidt develops the analogy that the righteous mind is like a tongue with six taste receptors. According to Haidt, morality is like cuisine: it's a cultural construction, influenced by accidents of environment and history, but it's not so flexible that anything goes. Moral matrices vary, but they all must please righteous minds

equipped with the same six social receptors. Haidt calls these receptors moral foundations. According to Haidt's Moral Foundations Theory, there are six psychological systems that compromise the universal foundations of the world's many moral matrices: Care/harm, Liberty/oppression, Fairness/cheating, Loyalty/betrayal, Authority/subversion, and Sanctity/degradation. Haidt's research has shown that liberals and conservatives tend to value and prioritize these moral matrices differently

The Care/harm foundation has deep evolutionary roots in the adaptive challenge of protecting and caring for children. Today, it has expanded to many more classes of vulnerable populations. The moral matrix of liberals, in America and elsewhere, rests more heavily on the Care foundation than do the matrices of conservatives.

The original triggers of the Fairness/ cheating foundations are acts of cooperation or selfishness that people show toward us. When people show signs that they can be trusted to reciprocate, we feel pleasure, liking, and friendship. When people try to cheat us or take advantage of us, we feel anger, contempt, and even disgust. On the left, the Fairness foundation is expressed in terms of concerns about equality and social justice. On the right, the Fairness foundation is expressed in terms of proportionality—the idea that people should be rewarded in proportion to what they contribute, even if that guarantees unequal outcomes.

The Loyalty/betrayal foundation is part of our innate preparation for meeting the adaptive challenge of forming cohesive coalitions. The original trigger for the Loyalty foundation is anything that tells you who is a team player and who is a traitor. This foundation teaches us to love loyal teammates and to hate traitors. The left tends toward universalism and away

from nationalism, so it often has trouble connecting to voters who rely on the Loyalty foundation.

We will continue with the other foundations in the next issue. However, it is important to emphasize that the answer to the question of why we are divided by moral and political issues is not because some people are good and others are evil, but because we have taste receptors or multiple moral foundations and we tend to value and prioritize these foundations differently, as with taste. Therefore, to create greater civic dialogue, we need to expand our palate and consider the value of each of the foundations and interpretations.

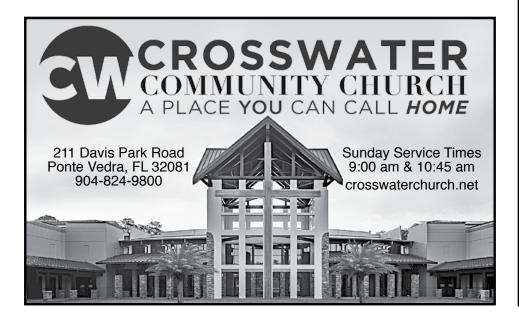

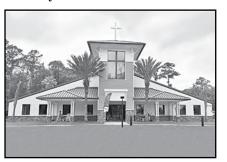


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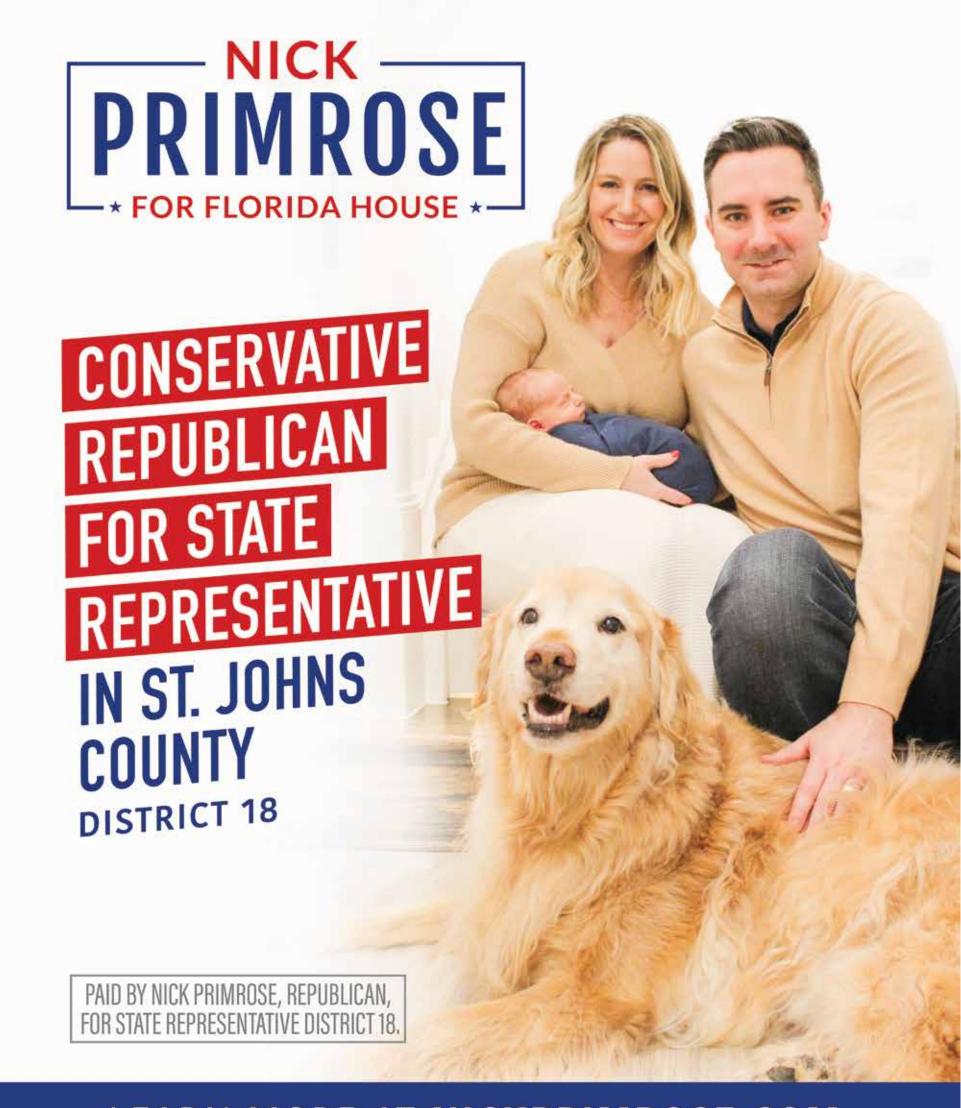

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Summer Home Maintenance Checklist

Summer is the perfect time to take advantage of the warm weather and get some work done around the house. Help keep your home performing efficiently during the summer by adding these tasks to your home maintenance plan.

Service your air conditioner. Regular maintenance can help ensure your air conditioner is working as efficiently as possible during the summer.

Hose down your exterior air conditioner unit. Air conditioners tend to collect dirt and debris over time, which reduces efficiency. Use a garden hose to spray the unit with water to remove buildup and help it run more efficiently. Also remove any nearby plants or weeds that could grow inside the unit.

Look for signs of critters and bugs. Check garden plants, trees and shrubs for insect infestations. Termites can easily go undetected until considerable damage has been done. Look for telltale signs like flaking wood or mud buildup and tunneling systems in the exterior wood. A professional pest control inspection may be needed.

Pressure washing. Spruce up the exterior of your home by pressure washing your sidewalks, porches and driveways. Fences and decks can also use a lower pressure cleaning.

Trim trees. Trees supply shady ambience and should be well cared for to avoid potential damage to your home. Keep branches pruned and at a safe distance from power lines and your home to help prevent storm-related damage. Inspect trees for signs of decay, such as cracks or hollowed limbs. Arborists or tree care professionals can help with the cutting and removal of large or high limbs.

Check gutters and downspouts. Safely clear all debris from gutters and see that downspouts are still routed properly so wa-

ter drains away from the house.

Inspect the roof. While on the ground, step back from your home and inspect the roof for maintenance from all sides to see if shingles are cracked, curled or missing.

Clean exterior dryer vent. Clean the outside clothes dryer vent to remove any built-up lint and allow your dryer to work more efficiently.

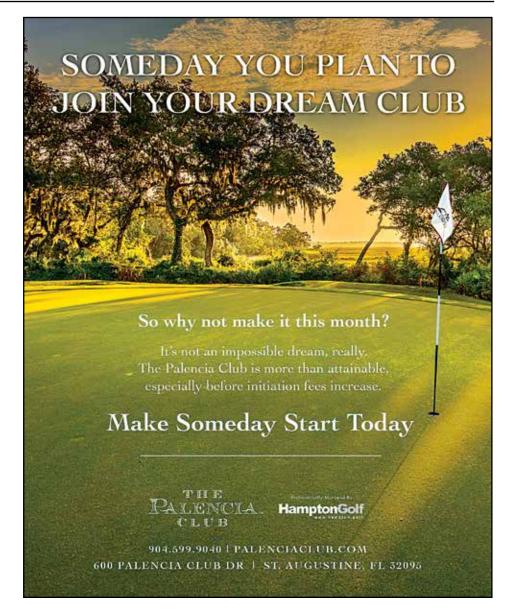
Inspect driveways and walkways for damage. Inspect the pavement for cracks and holes. Remedy them to help prevent accidental slips, trips and falls.

If you see weeds popping up between cracks in the pavement, resist the urge to pull them up. You'll remove the upper part of the weed, but the root system will remain intact and new growth will return. For a cost-effective solution, boil water in a kettle, carefully carry the kettle outside, and pour the water on any weeds to kill them off for the season.

Garage maintenance. There are many items that should not be stored in a garage. Hazardous materials such as paint, solvents and chemicals should be kept away from children and disposed of properly. Don't store heat-sensitive or combustible materials in the garage, as the temperature will be rising throughout the season. Consider storing power tools in locked cabinets to help keep away from children.

While these items are easier to perform in the summer, there are more home safety items to look at throughout the year such as having your chimney cleaned and checking on carbon monoxide detectors, fire extinguishers and your smoke detectors.

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
